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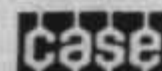
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Raiders end with good play

The Rice Raiders continued improving their play last week but their final football game Friday ended this season with another loss, this time at the hands of Belleville, 25-7.

It was Rice 7 and Belleville 0 with 1:30 left in the third quarter when the Raiders allowed their opponent to score. That practically was a copy of five other games this season, when opposing teams have scored with 38 seconds or less before the end of the half.

That half the Raiders held their defense, but in the second half, the defense wore out and allowed Belleville to field 19 more points, while the Rice defense managed only one first down.

The Raider team was slightly different too, with Rob Johnson and Dwayne Pagel seeing very little action and some other players getting the jump on next season. However, Charlie Amos, a senior playing his last game in a Rice uniform, was a standout on defense, causing

Belleville to throw an interception to Michael Davis, as well as blocking an extra point attempt.

Davis scored on that interception, and was responsible for the Rice point, as he was on the field for the last three seconds of the first half, when the Raiders allowed their opponent to score.

Next week, The Headlight, using statistics provided by Joe Fling and Leroy Alvarez, will detail other player changes in the Belleville game, as well as wrap up the season with current statistics for the year, and in some cases, for the careers of Raider players.

To start Friday's game, Davis kicked off and the defense immediately came on to shut down Belleville. First they threw the quarterback for a loss, then held an attempted run up the middle for no gain. When the Raiders were called for two offside penalties, Belleville took the chance to gain ground. Finally, after moving into Rice territory at the 34 yard line, Amos recovered

a fumble. Because the coaching staff wanted to close down the Belleville passing game, they moved Amos into a weak-side end position on the opportunity to knock down the ball.

It was in this short quarter that Amos powered in to cause the interception caught by Davis who took it in 20 yards for the score.

Here's where the Raider defense really came on to play. Belleville received the ball on their 12, and ran it back 31 yards to the 43. Sixteen plays later they had moved it down to the Rice four yard line, and threatened to score. But, Rice held, and took possession on their one yard line.

With Rice unable to move the ball from here, Davis had to punt again, and under pressure of kicking from behind the goal line, got off a pretty good kick that took a bounce in favor of Belleville.

The visitors then had the ball on the Raider 29 with another chance to

Deer season opens

Limit of one buck in this county

Hundreds of deer hunters from far and wide will pour into this and adjoining

counties for the opening of the 1982 deer hunting season this Saturday, November 13th. The deer will be legal targets through Sunday, January 2nd, 1983.

Optimistic forecasts for the upcoming season are based primarily on better than average rainfall in late winter and spring of 1982, making possible a good fawn crop and survival.

In Colorado County the limit is three deer, but the limit may include only one buck and a spike deer is considered as a buck deer. The other deer may be antlerless or doe deer but the antlerless deer may be killed only if the hunter has in his or her possession a permit issued by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The permits were issued Monday and Tuesday in the county courthouse at Columbus on the basis of one permit to 100 acres. The limits are the same in the neighboring counties of Austin, Lavaca and Fayette, but in Wharton County the limit is three deer, two of which may be bucks.

Legal shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

Deer hunters should also note that: A resident license, costing \$5.25, is required

possess a \$1.25 Resident Exempt Hunting license. A combination fishing and hunting license, costing \$8.75, meets the deer hunting requirements; Dogs may not be used to hunt deer;

Any deer killed by one person and in the possession of another must have all necessary tags and permits attached and signed by the person who killed the animal. Any portion of an animal given to another person must have attached a legible document signed by the person who killed the animal, stating his name, address, date of kill, hunting license number and the name of the county and ranch where the kill was made.

Parks and Wildlife Department biologists stated that hunters should find deer "fairly plentiful" in this area and in good shape with a better than average harvest. They add there appears to have been a good fawn crop and a good carryover from the 1981 population.

Department officials said that in view of the dry range conditions and relatively high deer populations, landowners and hunters are encouraged to utilize all the antlerless deer permits to which they are entitled.

Trout tagging program offers rewards

Bay fishermen are reminded by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to be on the lookout for tagged speckled trout along the Upper Texas Coast.

Department workers, assisted by employees of Houston Lighting and Power Co., tagged 540 trout caught from the company's discharge facility in Trinity Bay during late spring and summer 1982.

Returned tags bring rewards of \$1 to \$25, officials said. Reward money for the program is being provided by the Gulf Coast Conservation Association.

As of mid-August, anglers had returned 30 tags to the department. Tag returns have been located throughout the Galveston Bay system, with most coming from the lower bay areas. However, two were from the San Luis Pass area, about 50 miles from the release site.
