Rice girls close in contests

The Sealy Tigers clinched a victory over the freshman Raiders this past Friday night with a score of 25-16. It was a battle of wit, teamwork and organization in the Rice Gym.

In the beginning of the first quarter, the Raiders were galloping away with excessive energy to outplay the Tigers. However, the Tigers sprang into action and deflected many passes. Rice was stunned because the opponents benefited from deflected passes, putting four points on the scoreboard. Coach Clifton Darden then called time out, reviewing the strategic maneuvers the girls were taught. But it still was a discouraging time period when, in the three remaining minutes of the first quarter, Sealy pulled a fast switch on the Rice defense, interfering with the passes, and dominated the rebounds. It wasn't until Ware scored in a clean jumpshot that the Raiders snapped back into their fighting disposition. The highlight was when Renea Perdue stole from Sealy, dribbled toward the basket, threw a clean pass to Karen Bluntson who plopped in a "net" jump-shot.
