Truck incidents investigated

Two incidents are being investigated by the sheriff's office which sheriff Jim Brunsard thinks might be involved with the truck strike.

Last week the office received a call concerning some shooting in the Alhaur area. Deputies found that two gravel trucks parked on U. S. 90-A had been hit by bullets.

"Both vehicles' radiators had bullet-holes in them which appeared to have been made by a 9mm weapon," according to the sheriff's report dated February 1.

The next day a truck fire was reported on 90-A near Eagle Lake. Apparently Brunsard thinks might be of the truck. Damage was said to be minor.

In other reports, approximately \$800 in change was stolen early Saturday from a business in Oakland owned by Herbert Baines. There was no sign of forced entry.
