Nursing home reorganizes

The company which manages the Heritage House here, ARA Services, has announced a major reorganization of its nursing home group.

Previously identified by four separate company names, the nursing home group has been brought under one name, ARA Living Centers, according to Glendon E. French, president of ARA's health services sector.

He said the company's group has been divided into three geographic areas. Heritage House is one of 158 nursing homes now in the central division, formerly known as National Living Centers.

Nationally, ARA Living Centers manages nursing care services in 206 facilities, and centers for the care of the mentally retarded, totalling 31,272 beds in ten states. It is one of the largest nursing home care providers in the country, and it also manages four retirement centers with 555 beds.
