RHS art students win 11 awards at art competition February 12

Rice High School art students have been participating in the Scholastic Art Award's Competition for the past two weeks. After going to the Regional Awards Ceremony February 12, it was learned that Rice won eleven major awards. This number was second out of 66 finalist schools and was only under the 12 major awards of Aldine Contemporary Education Center.

Competition started with 50 schools on the district level with each art teacher at that school entering 15 pictures. Nine out of Rice's fifteen pictures were selected as district finalists. There are ten districts which had a total of 4,031 entries from 30 counties and 500 eligible schools.

Rice High School finalists were Laurie Bubela with two watercolors; Karen Schneider, one watercolor; Becky Benge, one acrylic painting; Joe Mike Young, one pencil picture; Darlene Lee, one pencil picture; and Troy Corman, one pencil picture and one ink picture.

On the Southeastern Texas Regional level district finalists continued through seven separate sets of judges. Half of the district finalists are eliminated and awarded to be Certificate of Merit finalists. None of Rice's nine district finalists were eliminated and they became nine out of one hundred forty-five art and photography projects named as Gold Key finalists. The Gold Key exhibition will be on display at the Glassell School of Art, 5101 Montrose, from February 12-27.

Regional awards ceremony Saturday, February 12, the Regional Awards Ceremony was held in Brown-Kudwig Hall at the Museum of Fine Arts in Houston. Rice students were named as major award winners.

Overly wet field conditions will linger through later this week across the Rice Belt despite better sunshine and warm temperatures that raise the soil drying rate. Another four to five day period without significant rain chances is the outlook for the Coastal Bend.

Producers will want to check field drainage systems more frequently. Temporary ditches may be a choice for removing standing water as quickly as possible. Wheat and other pastures will continue to show discoloration and poor performance as soils stay overly wet. The pace of seasonal soil temperature warming will be slow as backs while soils are too wet. Any period of fast soil drying would have the negative effect of causing rapid soil temperature cooling. Livestock problems with footrot disease will be aggravated by lingering mud in feedlots and other holding areas.
