The Difference
Off-season athletics a busy time

Times have changed in high school athletics. Years ago, after any specific sport ended, the players hung up their uniforms until the next season.

But that's not exactly the case today, as activity at Rice High School clearly indicates.

With the basketball season recently ended, those players, and players from other sports, are using their scheduled athletics class period to learn to overcome some of the deficiencies of the season just closed.

It's not just activity for the sake of either. There is a prescribed course of physical training, with goals established by the coaches, designed to improve abilities.

Tuesday, head basketball coach Jack Grammer outlined how he is asking his players to improve in jumping ability, upper body strength and quickness. He also has tests he will administer to measure progress toward

goals in those areas.

Having just finished a season with a team he describes as "just about, but not quite" good enough, he pulled statistics from game records to prove his point. They also show why progress is needed.

For district play, where the team finished with a 7-7 record, there was an average two-point spread between teams. The team lost four district games by a total of ten points, Grammer said. One game was lost by two points after five overtimes and in another, the Raiders lost by three. The team's season record was 17-12.

Grammer also cites inexperience as a problem during the past season, although he wasn't looking for excuses. Some players hit in the high teens during one game, but in the next scored few, if any points.

Next year, all but three starters will be back. Stanley Powell, Rodney Parker, Cedric Pope, Delbert Jarvis, Mel Pratt and Shawn Spaniel will be returning as seniors, while Malcolm Thomas will be a junior next year.

Rob Johnson, Rodney Sanford and Ed Thomas are the current seniors who will not be returning.

Parker and Johnson led the team this year in rebounding with 194 and 157 respectively, an average of 7.2 and 6.3 per game. For assists, Pope lead with 37 and a 1.4 average while Thomas was close behind with 35, averaging 1.3.

Players that played on subvarsity teams this year have an opportunity to make the varsity squad for the 1983-84 season, Grammer said. He listed Nelson Darden, Donald Ray Spears and "maybe" James Williamson who has a good aim for the basket.

To prep for that season, Coach Grammer said he is looking to each player to be able to press 20 percent more than his body weight, and to improve quickness which will be measured in several ways.

As for jumping ability, Grammer is looking for an increase of six inches in a vertical jump. He considers anything under a 24-inch jump as poor, and 24 to 28 inches as good. Excellent is 28 or over. Roughly, he estimated this year's team jumping average at about 23 inches, with some players as low as 16 inches.

Grammer and football coach Cliff Darden agreed that the athletic class periods were beneficial for the teams, but that they "are hard work — not just a whole lot of fun," Grammer said in his style for slight understatement. However, as both coaches look to next year, having finished a losing football season and a basketball season that produced no championship play, there are positive points.

One of them is team attitude. Darden said he was worried about next year's football season because the coach Cliff Darden agreed that the athletic class periods were beneficial for the teams, but that they "are hard work — not just a

Fayette shows oversized bass

The five o'clock rush is nothing compared to a weekend morning at Fayette Power Project Lake near here.

Lines of vehicles with boat trailers are often bumper-to-bumper on the access road and down State Highway 159, even before dawn.

The fortunate and patient among the waiting fishermen get the opportunity to fish one of the state's best trophy bass lakes. Those who lingered too long over their coffee are sometimes turned away when the 120-vehicle capacity of the parking lot is reached.

A creel survey conducted by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists on Sunday, February 13 gave some indication why most anglers believe fighting the traffic is worthwhile.

"During the day we examined one largemouth bass of 10 pounds, 14 three cents, along with a 9-11 and an 8-8," said biologist Wade Butler of San Marcos.

This and other surveys conducted recently indicate the 2,400-acre lake's bass population is continuing to produce excellent populations in the face of rather intense fishing pressure. One reason for the lake's continued productivity may be the three bass per day and 16-inch minimum length limit which has been in effect since the reservoir opened for fishing three years ago.

The lake was stocked with Florida strain largemouths immediately after impoundment, and so far the fish have done well in the power plant-heated water.

Butler said fishing at Fayette may improve during the next few weeks, since the bass he examined appeared to be almost ready to spawn.
