

Schulenburg wins academic meet

The first Eagle Lake Middle School Academic and Literary Invitational Meet for elementary and junior high students was held this past Saturday at the Middle School. Over 200 students from Columbus, Sheridan, Weimar, Schulenburg, Garwood and Eagle Lake participated.

The overall winner in all categories was Schulenburg which amassed a combined total of 127 1/2 points in the elementary and junior high divisions. Columbus placed second with a total of 120 points; Eagle Lake Middle School placed third with 55 points; Weimar placed fourth with 40 points and Sheridan placed fifth with 25 total points. Eagle Lake Primary placed sixth with a total of 12 1/2 points and Garwood came in seventh with 10 points. To determine these standings points were awarded for each student who placed first, second or third in the various events.

Each student who placed in the top three was awarded a medal and each student who won a fourth, fifth or sixth place was awarded a ribbon. Schulenburg was presented a very impressive trophy for finishing first overall.

ELEMENTARY DIVISION

In the elementary division the events were number sense, ready writing, storytelling, picture memory, oral reading and spelling. In grade two storytelling, Keith Bendy from Eagle Lake and Kim Hudec from Weimar tied for first place. Third place was won by Clint Riney of Columbus. Fourth, fifth and sixth places were won by Robert Dahse of Weimar; Kelli Walker, Eagle Lake; and Kenny Livingston, Columbus, respectively.

In the third grade storytelling event Shelly Behlen of Columbus won first place; Roderick Taylor of Weimar and Terri Vail of Columbus tied for second; Patrick Bire of Columbus and Amy Swindall of Weimar tied for fourth place and Jamie Marquart of Eagle Lake won sixth

place. Number sense standings showed Patti Hopper of Columbus in first place. Sarah Brenner of Schulenburg in second, and Will Frost of Columbus and Henry Zapalac of Schulenburg tied for third place. Fifth place was won by Wendy Bartek of Weimar and sixth place by Michael Grahmann of Sheridan.

Tonya Castro of Eagle Lake walked away with first place honors in ready writing. Columbus took second, third and fourth place with Becky Jentsch, Gary Gallaher and Jessica Hopkins. Fifth place was won by Belinda McClelland of Sheridan.

In fourth grade picture memory the Schulenburg team consisting of Lisa Ohnheiser, Alison Stryk, Sharon Ryan, Becky Hollas and Donald Zapalac won the first place honors. The second place team was Columbus and consisted of

The Raiders participated in a double elimination tournament held in Weimar March 10 through March 12.

In the top of the first inning, Rockdale jumped out to an early lead as the first three batters connected for base hits, and all three scored. The next three batters were retired in order.

The Raiders started a rally in the bottom of the second, and were able to push across two runs on six hits. They left two stranded on the bases.

In the top of the third, Rockdale got two more runs on two hits, making the score five to two. They added another unearned run in the top of the sixth, and again in the top of the seventh. The Raiders had five more hits throughout the game, but they were unable to score. The final

score was Rockdale 7, Rice Raiders 2. For the Raiders, Ellis had two for four; Corman had two for four; Munoz had two for three; Brown had one for one; Soto had one for three; and Ramirez had three for three.

In their second game of the double elimination tournament, Rice met Edna. The Raiders scored first in the top of the third as Ellis led off the inning and got on base on an error. 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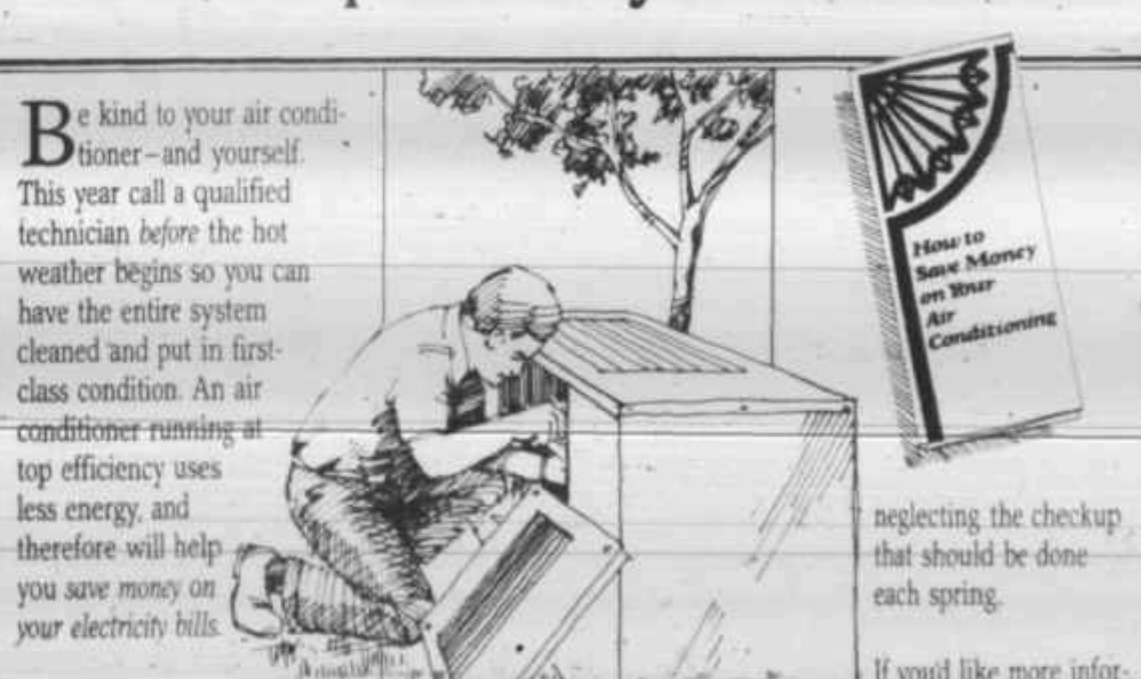
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
