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Homemakers' Reflections

If you are confused about all the new savings options available at the bank, you are not alone. Because Congress began to phase out restrictions on bank interest rates and balances in 1982, savings institutions now offer more choices to consumers. Derogulation is intended to make banks more competitive with money market funds.

The most recent derogulation allowed banks to offer superNow and money market accounts. The new accounts have earned many savers back to the banks.

Before investing in superNow and money market accounts, consumers should be aware of both their advantages and disadvantages.

Both superNow and money market accounts have many common features. Each requires deposits to maintain an average monthly balance of \$2,500. If the average monthly balance drops below the amount, the account will earn only the five and one-fourth percent interest applied to regular NOW accounts.

Both accounts are also federally insured up to \$100,000, and they allow check writing and telephone transfers. However, money market accounts limit the number of transfers and checks you can write each month.

Banks are allowed to guarantee an interest rate on both these accounts for up to one month. Some of

the banks are planning to tie their rates to a market index.

The security and convenience of these accounts might entice you, but keep in mind that neither account is ideal for everyone. Unless you regularly maintain a checking balance of \$2,500, for example, you would probably do better with a regular NOW account.

But money market accounts could be the right move if your savings have been idling away in a five and one-fourth percent passbook account. It may also be attractive if you have invested in a regular money market fund, but prefer the federal insurance and personalized service provided by the banks.

Disadvantages can occur with both types of accounts, too. Some may pay simple interest, have minimums on deposits and checks, make frequent changes in interest rates or have heavy early withdrawal penalties.

Other fees or penalties may be created in the near future as banks attempt to compensate for paying higher interest rates by charging for services which were once provided free.

If you decide to use one of these new savings options, investigate thoroughly. Read the fine print in the ads and brochures promising these accounts. Be sure that fees and penalties won't cost you more than the higher interest rates.

Your heart is a very important part of your body... It pumps blood through your blood vessels to every part of your body. Blood carries oxygen and food to all the cells that make up your body. You can see how blood flows through the two parts of your heart in the drawing at left.

Your heart is a very strong muscle. It starts to beat before you are born and continues to beat for the rest of your life without a single rest. You could not live without your heart. That's why it's important to take good care of it. You can learn how in the box below.

HEALTHY HEART TIPS

1. Eat a balanced diet that includes the foods in the "Wordfind" below. Go easy on sweets, oily foods, eggs, whole milk, butter, and salt.
2. Get plenty of exercise every day, like running, swimming, bicycling, skating, or jumping rope.
3. Don't smoke—EVER!
4. Have a checkup by your doctor at least once a year.
