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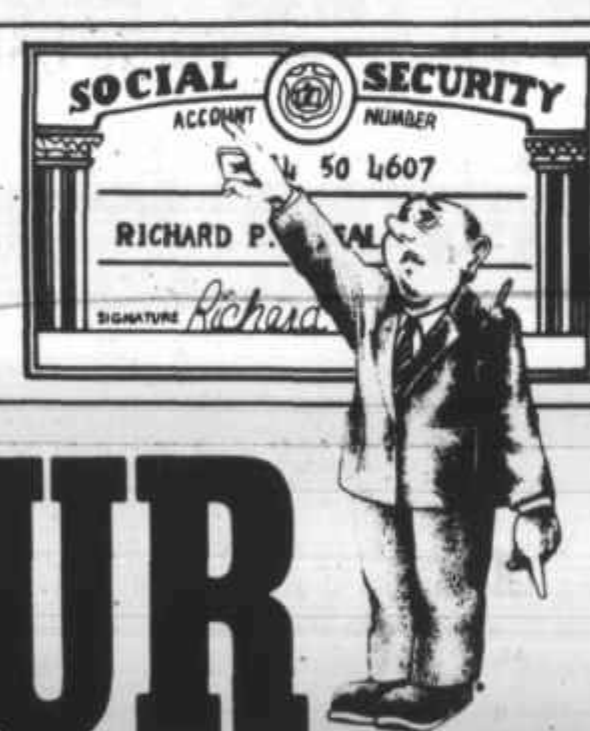

There are six new members to the Eagle Lake Chamber of Commerce, it was announced during the organization's regular monthly meeting Monday at the Sportsman Restaurant. The new members are Schindler LPG, Schindler Electric, M&S Distributing, K. R. Abel and Sons Trucking, GG Hunt Club, and S&W Parts. Secretary Fred R. Frnk

explained to board members the promotions planned by the Retail Trade Committee, to boost business here. He detailed the Easter promotion which is explained in another article in this issue of The Headlight.

Jo Ann Mahallie reviewed the Railroad Commission hearings held here concerning the request by Greyhound Lines, Inc. to discontinue bus service here. She said there has been no report from Austin on the decision, but that the chamber had correspondence from another company in Texas that said they would be glad to offer passenger and freight service here if Greyhound dropped Eagle Lake from its schedule.

Mahallie appointed Liz Waddell, Roy Dean Van Nort and William Harrison, Sr., to a committee to recommend to the chamber board whether or not it should pursue the adoption of a hotel-motel tax for the city. Revenues from such a tax would be used to promote the city.

The board approved a price of \$4.75 for the barbecue tickets for the chamber Memorial Day program and barbecue on May 30. The main menu will be beef and sausage. Committee reports included announcement that a "this place prize" was won by the R. PFA in the Columbus parade, using the chamber's Eagle Lake float. Harrison reported on activities of the industrial foundation, saying the group is actively pursuing new industry for its 50-acre tract east of the city. Ralph Truly reported

that in a survey he conducted, he learned that of 123 housing rental units he checked on, occupancy rate is around 90 percent. He also reported on the Tremendous home construction project. That company has a permit from the city for 10 houses. Seven are nearly complete and have been sold. Tremendous plans to build the three additional houses. Truly said the company is receiving as many as four inquiries each week, and that about one of five qualify for a purchase under the FHA subsidized construction.

Recent grade changes for lamb and mutton carcasses will result in several benefits to consumers, according to an animal science official at Texas A&M University.

Consumers will find the changes beneficial in relation to price as well as palatability and cutability. Cutability relates to yield while palatability has to do with tenderness, juiciness and flavor.

The grade changes should affect the marketing of lamb so that the average lamb will be leaner and thus cost less at the retail market. Lambs also should be moving to market at an earlier age, and young lambs are usually more tender.

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1982 deer harvest highest since 1975

The harvest of white-tailed deer during the past hunting season was the highest since 1975, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Hunters took an estimated 337,600 deer in 1982-83, which was the most since 1975, when the harvest was calculated at 348,900.

Officials said the hunter success ratio of 52 percent was the highest since 1975. The harvest in the Edwards Plateau (Hill Country) west of Austin and the brush country of South Texas. The harvest in the Edwards Plateau jumped from 149,200 in 1981 to 159,700 in 1982. This was the highest harvest since the 166,000 taken in 1979. Hunter success was 67 percent.

The South Texas total of 68,800 exceeded the 50,800 taken in 1981-82 and was an eight-year high. Hunter success ratio of 58 percent was the highest for that region since harvest surveys were initiated in 1973.

Increases in total harvest over the 1981 season were noted in the following ecological areas: Rolling

Plains of West Texas, from 4,800 to 7,000; Cross Timbers and Prairies, 22,700 to 30,800; and Post Oak Savannah, 28,500 to 32,700.

In the Pineywoods region of East Texas, where deer populations and harvests had been gradually increasing during the past decade, the 1982 harvest fell slightly from 29,500 to 28,300.

Other areas experiencing declines in whitetail harvest were the Trans-Pecos, from 1,800 to 1,100; Gulf Prairies and Marshes, from 9,700 to 8,600; Blackland Prairies, 980 to 450; and the High Plains, 300 to 200.

Officials said the total number of hunters dropped slightly from 533,100 in 1981 to 525,000 in 1982, but the total was comparable to the 10-year average. Hunters spent an average of 6.8 days in the field which coincidentally was the same figure estimated in 1975 when the previous high deer harvest was reported.
