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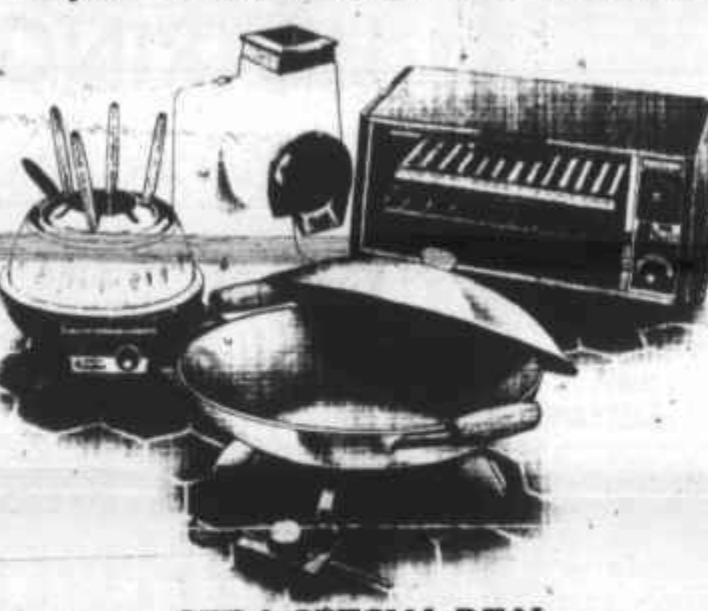

Homemakers' Reflections

You can make your own chocolate covered marshmallow Easter eggs using recipe for fluffy white filling that is so versatile. Use to fill your favorite chocolate molds or for any of the ideas listed below.

Marshmallow candy
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup light corn syrup

Combine gelatin and water in small glass mixing bowl; let stand 5 minutes. Stir in sugar and corn syrup. Microwave (high), uncovered, 3 to 4 minutes or until steaming hot, stirring once. Let cool 5 minutes. Beat on high speed about 7 to 10 minutes or until mixture forms soft pea. Use as filling for chocolate molds or try one of the following ideas.

TIP — If marshmallow sets up, microwave (high), uncovered, 1/2 to 1 minute or until again softened, stirring once.

Cut-out shapes
Pour marshmallow mixture onto waxed paper in a 1/2-inch layer. Let stand one to two hours or until mixture is set. Dip cookie cutter in warm water and cut shapes from marshmallow. (Simple shaped cookie cutters work best). Spoon melted chocolate over shapes and refrigerate or

freeze until set.

Marshmallow petit fours
Prepare marshmallow as for cut-out shapes. Dip kitchen shears or knife in warm water and cut into 1-inch squares. Coat with melted chocolate and refrigerate or freeze until set. Use decorating icing or colored coating, decorate each square.

Easter bunnies
Place 1 1/2 cups flaked coconut in small dish. Spoon slightly rounded tablespoon of marshmallow onto coconut; form into a ball with fingers while coating with the coconut. Place on waxed paper. Cut jelly beans in half lengthwise for ears. Use colored non-pareils for eyes and nose. Store tightly covered.

Nutty coconut balls
Prepare marshmallow as for Easter bunnies except roll balls in a mixture of 1/2 cup finely chopped nuts and 1/2 cup coconut. Omit decorations for bunny face. Store tightly covered.

Macaroni nests
2 1/2 cups flaked coconut
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 package (16 oz.) colored jelly beans
1/2 cup sweetened condensed milk
4 drops green food coloring
Combine coconut, sweetened condensed milk, and food coloring in a bowl. Turn a plain, white egg into a beautiful, colorful decoration for the Easter holiday.

Here is a simple Easter activity that youth and adults can do — you need only the simplest tools for a bit of sponging, spattering and combing. Information was taken from March 1983 Decorating Craft Ideas on page 66.

The smooth surface of an egg, like the smooth surface of paper or wood, invites painting. On these eggs, you paint with dye. First dip the egg in a base color. Then use a more concentrated dye for the easy old-time techniques of sponging, spattering, or combing.

Instructions
To decorate the eggs you will need white vinegar, a piece of cellulose kitchen sponge, a strip of cardboard, a toothbrush, a wooden skewer or popsicle stick, bleach bottle (or

Easter Eggs:
Sponged, spattered and combed

Sponged eggs
Place colored egg on top of a bottle lid. Dip toothbrush into the darker, concentrated shade. Run a stick over the bristles of the brush to spatter the egg with color. Rinse the brush in fresh water before changing colors. Before spattering the egg with a second shade, allow it to dry completely to prevent the colors from running together.

Spattered eggs
Place colored egg on top of a bottle lid. Dip toothbrush into the darker, concentrated shade. Run a stick over the bristles of the brush to spatter the egg with color. Rinse the brush in fresh water before changing colors. Before spattering the egg with a second shade, allow it to dry completely to prevent the colors from running together.

Combed eggs
Cut cardboard to resemble a comb. Dip teeth of comb into concentrate. Blot excess dye with paper towel or newspaper. Draw comb across the egg. Repeat: If lines are too pale, re-dip comb and leave in concentrate a little longer to allow the cardboard to absorb more color. Finish with first color and allow to dry before applying second.

The second batch of egg color (to be used to create the design) should be prepared in a concentrated form using one tablespoon vinegar and one tablespoon water. Mix additional colors in same manner. (You will need two concentrated colors for each technique.) Immerse the egg in the background color until it concentrates a little longer to allow the cardboard to absorb more color. Finish with first color and allow to dry before applying second.

'82 ag receipts down \$1 billion in Texas

Total cash receipts from farm and ranch products in Texas were down about \$1 billion — or 9 percent — last year compared to 1981.

Cash receipts from agricultural production last year are estimated at almost \$9.6 billion based on figures compiled by Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"This total figure is based on input from county extension economists from the various regions of the state," Anderson said. The total estimate does not include government payments.

"1982 was obviously a tough year for Texas farmers and ranchers due to the general downturn in economic conditions and poor farm prices that resulted from huge stock piles of agricultural commodities."

Weather losses also were heavy in some areas, particularly in the South Plains where hail destroyed more than half the cotton crop. Cotton led the decline in cash receipts from crops, which totaled almost \$3.8 billion compared to the previous year's \$4.6 billion. Cotton receipts dropped from \$1.4 billion in 1981 to \$875 million last year.

Sales of food grain crops, mainly rice and wheat, were down almost \$300 million at \$739 million. Feed crops — corn, grain sorghum, oats, barley, hay and on — were sold for just over \$1 billion, down only slightly from 1981 levels.

Oil crops — soybeans, peanuts, sunflowers, guar and flax — contributed \$228 million to last year's receipts — up moderately from the previous year.

Receipts from vegetables were at \$384 million while sales of fruits and nuts added another \$83 million; both of these categories of crops had reduced sales last year.

Sales of all other crops totaled \$412 million, up from \$399 million in 1981.

Sales of livestock products contributed most to the overall agricultural receipts in Texas last year — more than \$5.1 billion although the total was down \$300 million from 1981. This included the sale of meat animals, dairy products, poultry and eggs, and various other livestock products, such as wool and mohair.

Cash receipts from cattle and calves alone totaled \$3.8 billion or 40 percent of the state's agricultural sales.

Hog sales totaled \$113 million while sheep and goats contributed another \$65 million.

Sales of dairy products amounted to some \$545 million while poultry and eggs kicked in another \$514 million.

"Despite the economic woes in agriculture in 1982, Texas continues to rank third in the nation, behind California and Iowa, in total cash receipts," says Anderson. "The \$9.6 billion in agricultural receipts has a tremendous effect on the Texas economy to the tune of about \$35 billion in economic activity."

Looking to the future, the economist sees some encouraging signs for farmers and ranchers. "Farm prices and incomes will improve as supplies decrease and demand increases," says Anderson. "Hopefully, the PIR program will be successful in reducing the level of surplus commodities. In addition, production costs should be fairly stable through 1983, and reduced interest and inflation rates should also help the farm economy."

Due to illness, Marge Caldwell, the scheduled speaker, was unable to attend. She heartily recommended Patti Thompson, also an experienced Christian orator, who was gracious enough to come at late notice. A member of the First Baptist Church in Houston, she operates a modeling agency and is a gospel concert pianist. She

also teaches grooming classes for young people and travels across the country speaking at Christian functions.

Ms. Thompson spoke of Esther in the Bible and how God prepared her for her destiny and what an impact she made on history. She encouraged the ladies to look and be their absolute best for God.

After the talk, the women retired to the fellowship hall to eat a delicious lunch consisting of ham with raisin sauce, cold pea and rice salads, assorted muffins and gingerbread cake with whipped cream. Ms. Thompson honored the gathering with an impromptu rendition of "It Is Well With My Soul" on the piano during the luncheon.
