Reader responds to coaching situation

To the Editor:
After reading the article "Coaches given year to win" (Headlight, March 17), I would like to make the following remarks since I am an avid supporter of Rice High School athletics.

First of all the administration according to your article, has gone on record that it is interested in a successful sports program at Rice, which to me means a successful "all-around" program. It has gone so far as to challenge the coaches to win or else face the consequences. It is quite a challenge, in my opinion, especially in football, a 1-8-1 season, and according to reports, is not expected

to have nearly the material it has had the past three years. Sounds to me like a "real" challenge.

Secondly, I question whether or not the administration is really interested in an "all-around" successful athletic program, or whether it wants a successful football program. Basketball at Rice has proven to be one of the most successful programs in the state, and the track team has had its share of success also and is showing a lot of promise this season. Baseball hasn't captured any district championships but this is not always a fault of poor coaching. If you look at a list of winners in the districts that the Rice

baseball team has participated, you will more than likely find that those towns have very strong summer programs in their respective communities, not just little league, but teenage leagues, too.

The only other sports at Rice are golf and tennis. If the administration wants a successful golf and tennis program, I would suggest that it show its support by making funds available to hire a golf pro or tennis pro, rather than having football coaches sponsor these programs. And also show support by setting up a golf and tennis class period during school hours.

Thirdly, most coaches at Rice take their classroom teaching quite seriously, as they have been told through the years that they are a teacher first and a coach second. Yet, their classroom abilities have been completely overlooked and have no bearing on whether contracts will be extended or not. I would suggest that in the future all coaches be

exempt from classroom duties so they can concentrate their full attention to developing an "all-around" successful sports program at Rice High School, especially since that is what the administration apparently wants.

Finally, if the Raiders have a disappointing "all-around" win-loss record next year and a coaching change is made by our administration, who will be to blame if an improvement is not made the following year, or the following year or the following year?

Developmental Screening Clinic

The Rice Consolidated Independent School District will conduct a developmental screening clinic for pre-school children on April 18 and 20. Children ages birth to three will be screened in a county-wide clinic to be held in Columbus on Monday, April 18, at the First United Methodist Church. The clinic for pre-schoolers ages three and above will be held at the United Methodist Church in Eagle Lake on Wednesday, April 20. The purpose of this screening will be to identify children who might be developmentally delayed or have some handicap that would make them eligible for special school or home educational programs. Children so identified will be eligible for a two week assessment to be held in June.

Children with physical handicaps; vision or hearing problems; health problems; delays in language or speech problems; poor coordination skills; inability to understand when spoken to; slowness to learn; and similar problems might be eligible.

Economic news bad

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

The economic bad news got worse at the Capitol last week when State Comptroller Bob Bullock told legislators his revised revenue estimates fell \$1 billion short of his earlier prediction, leaving state budget architects with \$2.4 billion less from his original figures.

Meanwhile, the figures on last month's unemployment rate reached nine percent, a post-World War II record for Texas.

Capitol watchers who study political maneuvering saw two unusual occurrences last week: Gov. Mark White lost his first big political battle in the Senate—and, amid several state newspaper editorials calling for House Speaker reform a small group of House members

launched a program to house Speaker Gib Lewis' power.

The Senate rejected Gov. Mark White's repeated demands for election of Public Utility Commission members. During debate on Sen. Kent Caperton's PUC reform bill, four amendments calling for election of commissioners were voted down.

Power dilution
House Majority Leader Bob Bush, D-Sherman, said he is working on rule changes to reduce the power of the speaker by installing a House executive committee.

Bush, who said he does not seek the speakership himself but who is frequently mentioned as a possibility, said Lewis' ineptness and "imperial speakership" was hampering the Legislature.

New speaker?
Several legislators have said privately that Lewis may find himself challenged when the session ends at the end of May.

Three candidates mentioned besides Bush are Bill Messer, D-Belton; Stan Schlueter, D-Killeen; and Gerald Hill, D-Austin. Lewis met with Bush last week and issued a statement saying Bush's plan would reshape the Texas House along the same lines as the U. S. Congress, which was a bad

—Overhauling the state textbook selection process under the State Board of Education.

—Giving recreation and wildlife conservation equal status at the Matagorda Island State Park.

House committees also approved a bill prohibiting the use of state funds for refusing to perform interracial marriages, sent to subcommittee a bill raising the legal drinking age to 21, and subpoenaed the telephone records of an alleged gambler lobbyist.

Last week Senate committees approved a \$125 million construction fund for 25 state colleges (minus the severance tax proposed by Lt. Gov. Hobby); approved a 1984 state referendum to legalize betting on horse races; and passed a Houston auto inspection program aimed at salvaging about \$235 million in federal highway funds to the city. The funds threatened to cut off the Texas because of the city's high level of air pollution.

Bullock, Krueger, Hill
Comptroller Bob Bullock made unsavory headlines last week when he was indicted for driving his car at 106 mph down an interstate highway. The state trooper who stopped Bullock told reporters the comptroller's breath smelled of alcohol and that he admitted to having consumed two cans of beer.

Bullock, a recovered alcoholic, denied the DWI implication and said he was taking a defensive driving course instead of paying the \$206 speeding fine.

Former Texas Congressman
Bob Krueger said last week he will challenge Republican U. S. Sen. John Tower again in 1984. Krueger narrowly lost to Tower in the 1978 match. Meanwhile, State Sen. Lloyd Doggett of Austin, said he may join that contest and accused Krueger of being a "warmed over Republican."

Former Atty. Gen. John Hill filed documents indicating he will run in 1984 for Texas Supreme Court Chief Justice. The incumbent, Jack Pope, has said he will not seek election.
