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Pink ladies participate in medic alert program

National Medic Alert Week was observed from April 9-10. It is held each year to educate the public about available Medic Alert services.

Medic Alert International is a non-profit organization founded in 1966 to provide an emergency identification system for persons with special medical problems or with problems not easily recognized, such as deafness.

The system is based on the fact that emergency personnel can perform their job faster and more efficiently if they know of severe allergies or diseases which a patient may have.

The Medic Alert System works three ways:

1. A bracelet or medallion is worn which is engraved with the medic alert emblem, a symbol that is internationally recognized.
2. On the reverse of the bracelet or medallion is a 24-hour emergency number and the specific problem a person has.
3. A toll free, 24-hour number can be called to receive vital information on the patient.

Each individual enrolled in the program carries a wallet size card with pertinent information. This tells a little more about the patient and his/her problem. The card is updated annually.

The Medic Alert Program offers a lifetime of protection for only \$15. This is a one-time charge. All information is strictly personal.

definitely is beneficial to their children. They also wanted to see that the program was not diluted through change, making it less effective.

Before they spoke Abel told the board he was planning to tighten the entrance requirement to the program, and possibly expand it to other areas. For instance, students doing well in social studies would be separated from slower students. This provides classrooms for the slower classes to allow teachers to work with the students more, while not hindering the more advanced student.

The board also approved participation in the Region III education service center Migrant Coop program, for which the district receives \$32,000. Apparently those federal funds will not be available in the future.
