Raider track meet successful

One of the largest track and field meets at Rice High School was declared very successful this week, despite an accident that injured a visiting participant.

The coaches on the staff organized and oversaw the entire show, athletic director Cliff Darden said. "I told them if they wanted a meet, they would have to put it on...and they did," he said.

What could have been a tragic accident after lunch has turned out to be a bad injury rather than a crippling injury, the coaches said. About 1:30 p.m., a pole vaulter from a visiting team failed to push the pole away as he topped the bar. The pole caught in his mid-section, forcing the jumper to retain his hold on the pole, and eventually fall to the ground, missing the mat.

Coaches said the student hit on his head and shoulders and was stunned, but wanted to get up. An ambulance was called to transport the boy to the hospital here. He then was transferred to a hospital in Houston where doctors were able to prevent permanent nerve damage.

Thirteen teams participated in the events throughout the day, with the 880 yard run perhaps the featured event. Dayton came to the meet just to pit their runners against Andy Anderson, coach Finest Axel said.

Anderson prevailed with a time of 1:59.97, compared to Dayton's 2:02.09. Discussion after the race indicated Anderson will win first in the long jump and the Dayton runner was fading.

Rice fielded teams for the freshman, junior varsity and varsity competition, winning second in junior varsity, third in varsity and seventh in freshman.

The third place varsity finish was without the efforts of hurdler Phillip Schorlemmer or Cleveland Scott who is the last leg runner in the relays. "Those guys can add 20 points to our score," Axel said, "and their not being able to participate hurts."

Schorlemmer has an ankle injury and Scott a groin pull.

Even without those two, the Raiders were only three points behind second place East Bernard, and fell behind first place Sweeney that scored 102.5.

Of the 15 events, Rice won first in the long jump by James Powell with a 21' 4" mark; 440 yard relay with the team of Allen Jones, Rodney Parker, Ed Thomas and Powell, and the 880 yard run with Anderson. Parker won a second in the 220 and Jones placed third in the 440 yard dash.

The meet could be classed as one of the final steps in preparation for the district track meet later this month at Prairie View A&M. Saturday the team travels to Cuero. Axel said if Schorlemmer and Scott are able to participate in district competition, they won't be at full steam.

In the freshman competition, Rice's seventh place was earned with an overall 32-point score compared to first place Dayton with 127. Sweeney was in second place with a 98, and Waller placed third with 87.

Renditions and other property reports ordinarily may be filed at any time from January 1 through April 30. This year since April 30 falls on Saturday the deadline is extended to May 2, 1983.

The appraisal district staff has completed the 1983 visits to the various communities. Please come to the first floor of the courthouse from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday by May 2nd, if you have not signed for 1983. Open-space and homestead exemptions will be honored automatically if the property qualified in 1982 and there is no change for 1983. It is very important for owners of newly purchased agriculture land and homesteads that have not qualified previously to sign exemptions in 1983.

It also is important to update our files on personal property for businesses and individuals. Farm equipment and livestock no longer are taxable.
