Miss Treibig read selections to illustrate the wide range of subject matter written about by the poets of that era: from people — Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson; to places — Manassas and Bull Run; to things — a beautiful and moving tribute to our Confederate flag.

The meeting was adjourned and delicious refreshments were served by hostesses Mesdames Jack Draper, Nick Mainer, and Creston Gay and Miss Treibig.

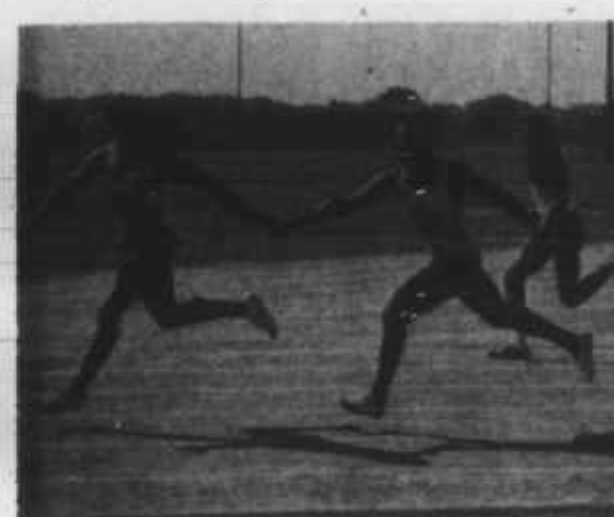

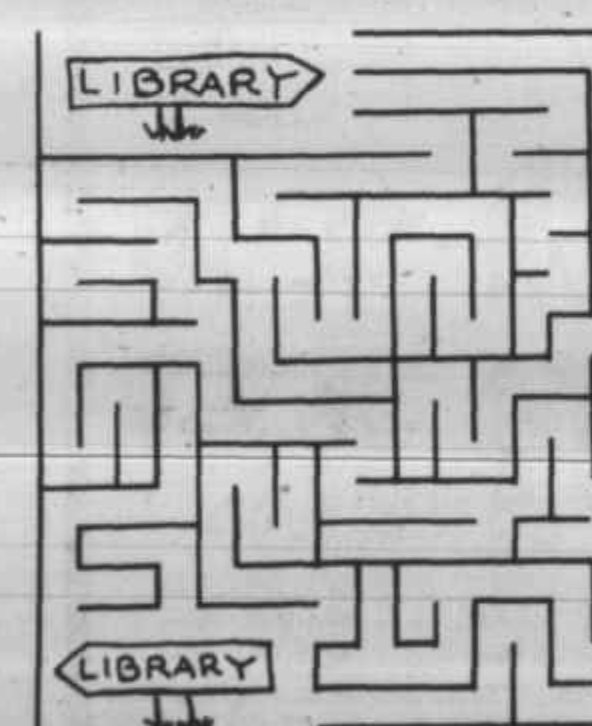

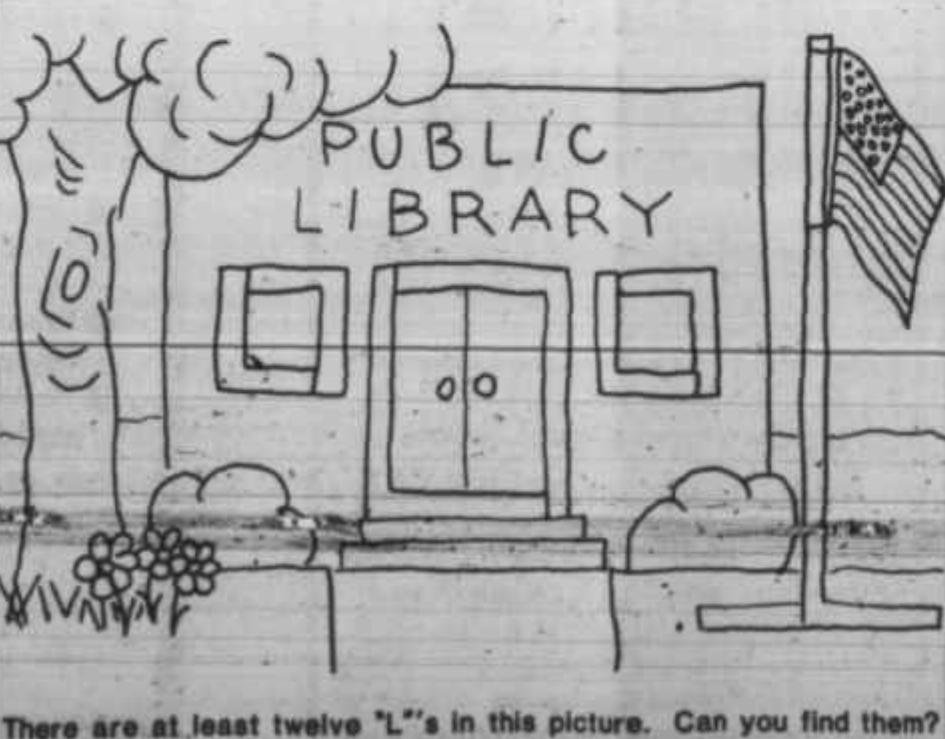
