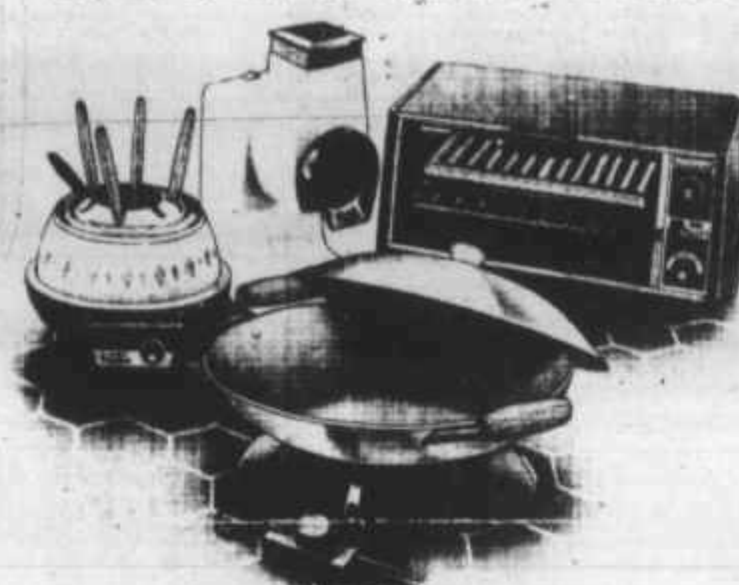


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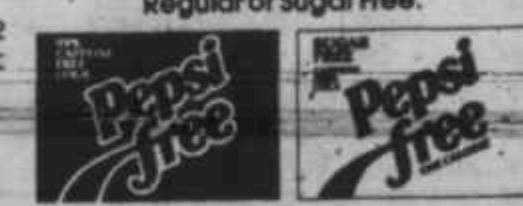


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Rice future homemakers attend state meeting

Pecan Field Day May 6

[By Leroy J. Hajdik, County Extension Agent] A Pecan Field Day will be held Friday, May 6 starting at 10 a.m. at the Frank Kolek pecan bottom. Certainly this is an excellent opportunity for pecan producers, whether they be dooryard or commercial tree owners, to get the latest information on pecan production.

The Kolek pecan operation is located approximately one and one-half miles south of Borden on County Road 210. Borden is located on US Hwy. 90 between Weimar and Columbus.

One of the key objectives of the annual event is trying to accurately pinpoint the spraying dates for control of the pecan nut casebearer. Also tied in with the program will be discussions on disease control, weed control and pecan cultural practices.

Extension Service specialist assisting in the field day will be Drs. Charles Cole, Jerral Johnson, George R. McEachern, John Cooper Pecan Pest Management specialist will also be present to discuss new trends in pecan pest management.

In the event of rain the program will be conducted at the Weimar City Hall.

The field day is being jointly sponsored by the Colorado and Fayette County pecan committees in cooperation with the respective county Extension agents.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.
