She is survived by her husband; her daughter, Vivian Thomas of Spartanburg, S.C.; sons, H. T. On May 30 Mrs. Lewis wrote the following letter to her children. The family has requested that it be published.

Dear Friends and Loved Ones:

For a long time I have wanted to leave a letter to my children and grandchildren — maybe they will read it and know me a little better — when they are older.

I was born a poor country girl and such I have always been. My father was a sharecropper and there were eight of us kids to feed in the great depression — of course not all were born in the 30's some were born in the 40's which wasn't much better for us. I myself was born July 2, 1927.

I will not speak of my mother — how hard her life must have been — eight kids, work, work, very little food.

But my father was a child of God, full of love and joy for the little kids who sat around the floor at his knees while he read the word of God — only a third grade education but he had read his bible so often it flowed from his lips in beauty.

When I married Herbert on March 6, 1948, the world took on a new beauty. Herbert was my sun, moon and stars — still something was missing — it was like a love in me crying to be let out. There was my children and no mother has ever loved more.

So all my life at each and every new church I went to — from my youth up — I always made the altar call — always looking for something I never found.

My sister, Liz, tells me we were baptized at the Lissie Church. Sorry I didn't remember it until she reminded me.

And then one night as I began to pray, I was wide awake. Jesus appeared to me much the same as he did to Paul 28 years later it is as fresh in my mind as tho it happened yesterday.

I love flowers. I pot them — grow them and give them tender care. A flower needs good rich soil. A poor life we would have without the wonderful soil God gave us to grow our food. And so God has formed me from soil to soil my body returns — I like that.

But God also gave me a spirit and it was hardly ever at rest. What I really needed was to love more — but how? And so I prayed to God to help me to know and love him better. God answered that prayer — but it took years. First God had to come before husband and kids — so hard.

But one day the Holy Spirit came and planted a tiny seed in this rich soil called a body. That tiny seed grew. It became a large lily. The bud came on one day and began to grow — so large it seemed it would soon have to burst open — and yet it grew more and then one day it did burst open — and out poured a sweet sticky honey — and everywhere the honey ran — Love, Love — oh such love followed. God and Jesus were new and so loved. Loved ones were loved as I never dreamed. I could love. The whole world was Gods and to be loved.

And so my friends as you hear or are told this story, I will be standing or kneeling before my Lord and I will give back to him the beautiful flower of his Love for he has promised I have all eternity to Love Him.

Please sing "Amazing Grace" and "Those Golden Bells a Ringing." Please let Brother Sibley read and use any part he wants for my funeral. I hope very much he tells my flower story — of course this flower story is only my way of saying how God's love, faith and trust grew in me when I began to read and study His word. How it grew until it became my life and how I have loved walking life's road with Him beside me.

Thank you God for each minute you gave me.

County Agent's Notebook

With all the information available, on the PIK (Payment in Kind) program and its associated options, there are still confusing aspects. In all instances of doubt, consult the local ASCS office.

In a recent news release, a statement was made concerning the grazing or haying of cover crops on conserving use acreage following the locally designated non-use period. Haying or any mechanical harvest is not allowed on this acreage at any time. The cover crop may be plowed under or shredded down to improve the soil. It may be grazed following the restricted period, but no mechanical harvest is permitted.

This may be a point of confusion for some people because of the many acres of small grains planted prior to January, 1983 that were allowed to be harvested for hay. This will not be the case for crops planted after January, 1983. All cover crop planted after January on conserving use acreage will be subject to the "no mechanical harvest rule."

All questions regarding these types of rules should be referred to the local ASCS office that is responsible for the area where the land is located. That ASCS office will have all the rules and regulations applying to the particular acreage along with appropriate dates for programs.
