Grass clippings can add
value to your compost pile

Instead of throwing away grass clippings when you mow your lawn, put them to use in a compost pile, suggests a landscape horticulturist.

Dr. William C. Welch, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, says compost is a good source of organic matter for gardens and flower beds. Furthermore, composting is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and similar plant material.

Make the compost pile four to six feet wide and any length, depending on material and space available. The simplest composting method is to alternate four to six inch layers of plant matter, such as leaves or grass, with two to four inches of good garden soil, says Welch. Add manure to the soil layer if it's available, and sprinkle commercial fertilizer on each layer of plant matter to hasten decomposition. Use a cupful of fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ratio per 10 square feet.

The top layer of the compost pile should be soil and the surface should form a basin to hold water. Water

Dr. Thomas retains AAFP membership

Dr. Raymond R. Thomas of Eagle Lake has completed continuing education requirements to retain active membership in the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors.

The requirements call for members to complete a minimum of 150 hours of accredited continuing medical study every year. Members become eligible for re-election at the end of the third year following their election to membership. The academy, the country's second largest medical association, was the first national medical group to require members to keep up with medical progress through continuing education. Founded in 1947 and headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., the academy said it was instrumental in the establishment of a new primary specialty in family practice in 1969. The new specialty is expected to increase the number of family physicians available to serve the public in the future.

The academy's continuing education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.
