Ashby, Drumm golf winners

Brook Ashby and Modina Drumm were the top scorers in the second annual July 4th Recreation Center Golf Tournament held here Monday for members and guests.

The tournament, with 56 players, was divided among four flights for the men, and one for the women, with first through fourth place cash prizes in each flight.

Glen Sundermann, Aubrey Mires and Frank Pidgeon were the winners in the other men's flights.

Also, a drawing was held for a dozen boxes of golf balls, and a set of woods. Combined with the Recreation Center bar-b-que luncheon where about 375 were fed, the day was a \$1,000 fund-raiser for the Eagle Lake recreation facility.

According to Ashby, several fun tournaments are on the remainder of the center's summer schedule, with another club tournament scheduled this fall.

In winning the men's championship flight, Ashby fired a 39 on the first nine then came back with a blistering 33 to finish with a 72, three strokes ahead of the nearest competitor.

Drumm, of Columbus, shot 49-44, for a gross score of 93, giving her a net score of 62 to win the \$80 first prize by five strokes over Pat Cook. She shot 51-47 for a gross of 98 and net of 67 and to take home \$40.

Winners in each of the four men's flights received \$100 for first, \$50 for second, \$25 for third, and \$15 for fourth. Entry fee was \$25.

rates from CPL have increased more than 50 percent, Struss said.

Other rate increases proposed in a ordinance that was written in 1961 include: water line taps, from \$100 to \$175; sewer line taps, from \$40 to \$125; residential city utility service deposit from \$25 to \$50; commercial utility service from \$50 to \$75; or twice the average monthly bill, whichever is greater; plumbing inspections from \$5 to \$20; and emergency utility service calls from \$6 to \$10.

The service increase is effective immediately through a resolution council approved. Those calls occur many times when a resident needs water turned off at the city meter because of a problem on private property. The fee is meant to prompt customers to
