Hunting and fishing license sales are up

Sales of resident hunting, fishing and combination licenses are selling at a record pace, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials. During the first five months of fiscal year 1982-83, the department sold 664,299 resident combination hunting and fishing licenses, bringing in \$5,650,869 in revenue. This is an increase in revenue of more than \$500,000 over the same five-month period in 1981-82, officials said. Resident fishing licenses showed a big increase, amounting to 5,388 more licenses than the previous year and a revenue jump of more than \$25,000. Officials expect total sales of the hunting-fishing combination licenses and resident fishing licenses to reach an all-time high by the end of the current fiscal year, August 31. The department has sold 265,800 resident hunting licenses, which is an increase of more than 6,000 over the previous period, and a revenue increase of more than \$31,000. Nonresident licenses for both hunting and fishing also are on the upswing, officials noted. Revenues from nonresident hunting licenses increased by \$100,000 over the previous year. County Extension Agent Homemakers' Reflections

A ceiling fan uses about the same amount of electricity as a 100-watt bulb. You can run one for 10 hours for approximately seven cents. But that's not the most important energy saving feature of ceiling fans. You will save money with a fan only if you raise the thermostat on your air conditioning unit to a higher setting. A three-ton air conditioning unit for example, uses approximately 49¢ of power each year if set on 72 degrees. If the thermostat can be raised to 78 degrees and you are still comfortable due to a ceiling fan, the cost of operating the air conditioner will drop to \$386 a year. That is a difference of \$102 a year for a 6 degree drop in the thermostat setting. Settings higher than 78 degrees would decrease your costs even more. A ceiling fan does not actually affect the temperature of the air. It merely circulates air. The reason a fan makes you feel cooler at the same temperature is the wind-chill factor. As air moves across the body, a wind chill factor makes you feel from 4 to 6 degrees cooler. When you are satisfied with your plan, move items to their new location. As your family changes and your storage needs change, reconsider your storage plan to be sure it still meets your needs. Several recent burglaries are being investigated by the Eagle Lake Police Department. On July 15, Charles Stephens, a pilot for Rice Aero, reported a battery and four tires and rims stolen from a Ford Mustang. He said the theft occurred sometime in the previous two days. The vehicle was parked at Rice Aero for a long period of time, according to the police report, awaiting repairs. On July 20, Fred R. Frank of Melody Lane told police that a flag was stolen from the pole at his home. He said a flag also was stolen from a neighbor's pole. The police report indicated entry was gained over a fence. On July 26, Elmo McTear reported about \$150 in cash missing from his home in the 1300 block of Seaholm St. According to the police report, he suffered the wound when he intervened in a family argument between brothers Kelly and Johnny Jobe in the 500 block of Gonzalez. Kelly also suffered a gunshot wound but was treated and released from the hospital.

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WCJC satellite campus

Wharton County Junior College officials guided the Fort Bend County Satellite Campus down for a soft landing this month on green fields near the Ryon Hospital in Richmond during ground breaking ceremonies witnessed by enthusiastic Richmoud-Rosenberg area officials and civic leaders. Miss Satellite Campus, coed Lynn Martin, a 30-year old Rosenberg housewife and college sophomore, planted the college banner in a 10-acre tract of land made available on Preston Street (Farm Road 3155 to Richmond State School) through a generous three-year lease agreement between the school and the George Foundation of Richmond. A portable educational building to be spotted at the site will be ready for occupancy by about August 1. Joe Hubenak who termed the bill "a move in the right direction." "I would like to see every acre of land in Texas be in a junior college district," said the Chamber representative who now owns a business in Rosenberg after many years in the Texas Legislature. George Foundation executive director John G. Heard of Richmond expressed his continued support for Wharton County Junior College noting, "There is no reason to have a junior college in each of the over 250 counties of Texas." He predicted that association with the college's satellite program "is going to save the taxpayers a lot of money in the long run." Heard continued: "I think the concept and wisdom of the Wharton County Junior College board in being willing to spread itself just beyond the limits into other counties and to allow its academically approved facilities to be used is a significant step forward. We appreciate that Wharton County Junior College is in its permanent temporary site and look forward to the not-too-distant future when it has a permanent permanent site in the Richmond-Rosenberg area," he concluded. Wharton County Junior College received a \$750,000 gift last year from the George Foundation for constructing a building when the college obtains permanent campus property. Wharton County Junior College president, Dr. Theodore Nickisch, Jr. thanked the George Foundation and Heard for "their benevolence and interest in seeing that the good of the people in this area is served by Wharton County Junior College." Dr. Nickisch also noted long-time cooperation of officials within the Lamar Consolidated Independent School District, Fort Bend County, cities of Rosenberg and Richmond, and Rosenberg-Richmond Chamber of Commerce. "We are thankful to the whole civic community for the marvelous job they have done for us," he commented. The school initiated off-campus night classes at School in 1969 but expanded the program in 1980 to include day classes at the then-new and partially occupied B. F. Terry High School. The Terry High School lease expires August 1 due to increased high school enrollment. College trustee chairman Dr. J. Daniel Schumann of East Bernard officially turned the first shovel of soil after commending everyone toward the success of the Wharton satellite program. "It certainly is a wonderful day to come here and see some of the dreams come true for a lot of people in this area and on our campus," remarked Dr. Schumann. Trustee Dr. C.E. Woodson of Wharton also represented the college in the ceremony. Richard Arnold of Wharton will oversee construction of the 6,480 square foot educational complex which has six separate classrooms, a lounge and office space. The non-duplicated satellite campus head count for spring 1983 was close to 300 daytime students. More than 250 additional students attended night class. Registration for the first term of summer school reached 172 and officials expect fall registration for day classes alone to reach 500. The college board of trustees has increased of-campus fees this fall at the satellite facility. Students will pay \$5 per semester hour in addition to regular tuition and fees paid by students enrolled at the main campus in Wharton.

Shock probation granted

Another man from Colorado County has been released from the Texas Department of Corrections after spending only about five months in prison. Billy Zickuhr of Columbus was released July 19 by District Court Judge Gus Strauss. According to the district court clerk, the judge granted shock probation in the case. Zickuhr originally was sentenced on February 21 in connection with a fire at Poor Boys cafe near Columbus. Also on July 19, Judge Strauss sentenced a man to the TDC in a case involving the theft last year of a battery from the Garwood ambulance. Marvin Johnson received a sentence of not less than two years and not more than eight years, but also is a candidate for shock probation. The charge was burglary of a vehicle.
