percent of the work. "I recommend that no more payments be made, that we immediately consult with our attorneys and the legal counsel for the architect, and we proceed from there," King said. The board vote gave him instructions that the board wants the stronger roof for the money it is paying.

In other business, the board:

- Learned the 1984 tax rate could be set at approximately 73.8 cents per
- Agreed to have the annual budget and tax rate adoption meeting on August 22 at 8 p.m. at the administration building
- Liked the change of the Eagle Lake Middle School 5th grade music-art program; instead of students choosing from art or band, they now will take art one day then general music the next. (See Back to School section on middle school.)
- Agreed to pay \$50 toward each employee's health insurance, an increase of just under \$6. The board also gave King approval to negotiate with various companies in securing health insurance. Under the present company, both single and family health insurance coverage premiums are going up drastically.
- Amended then accepted the bid from the First National Bank of Eagle Lake to be the school district's financial depository.

For all Coastal Plains producers. You will need to keep work plans flexible over the next few days as rain and dew will keep soil wet much of the time. If you can enter fields to harvest, get as much done as soon as you can. Places where soil is already too wet to harvest probably won't see enough drying for soil to support equipment for one or two days at least. Field drying of rice will be significantly delayed, so it may be advisable to harvest at higher than desirable moisture and spend the money for drying.

Downpours could help reduce the local pest insect population, but most areas will continue seeing increases in bollworms and soybean insects. Pest problems could intensify, especially where lush growth is sustained. Field scouting remains important, but pesticide spraying will be touch and go because of the high washoff risk. Use chemicals needing a short contact time — if spraying can't be postponed.
