This is a county wide resource set-up for families in need of clothing. At the present time we strictly have children's clothing.

A limit of two (2) outfits, one (1) pair of shoes, three (3) pairs of socks, and three (3) changes of underwear will be set for each child. The first visit of a family will be handled with no charge, subsequent referral will require payment of the minimal charges made for items. Money collected from the sale of clothing will be used to buy additional clothing for the room and to meet the needs of foster children in our county.

We hope this will be a service to the children in our county and that people in need will use this resource.
