Recent diabetes research findings cause confusion

"Considerable confusion has resulted from recent news reports on new research findings on the effects of sugar and starches on blood glucose levels in persons with diabetes.

These research findings, some of which are preliminary in nature, and which have been conducted on relatively small numbers of patients, must be carefully studied and evaluated before any changes in current nutrition and dietary requirements for diabetics may be recommended.

The American Diabetes Association has announced that its National Council on Nutrition will convene a special panel of top medical experts from the United States and Canada later this month to investigate new and emerging research data to determine whether to revise its current 'Principles of Nutrition and Dietary Recommendations for Individuals with Diabetes Mellitus.'

In the meantime, the Association recommends that persons with diabetes should continue to avoid sugar and products containing sugar, eat foods low in fat and high in complex carbohydrates and fiber, and follow the dietary programs prescribed by their physicians and health professionals," according to Karl Sussman, M.D., president-elect of American Diabetes Association.

Pavement repair on IH-10 in Austin County to begin soon

A contract for concrete pavement repair along Interstate 10 in Austin County has been awarded by the Texas Department of Transportation and Public Highways and placed in Columbus.

This project, which extends from the Colorado County line, East to the Waller County line, was discussed Monday with Park and Snyers Construction, Inc. of Houston. The 14.991 mile project, consisting of repair existing concrete pavement, seal joints and place expansion joints, was bid at \$1.2 million.

The work, which is expected to begin this month, should be completed in 250 working days.

Another man was arrested last week in connection with the burglary. They were arrested in Austin County on July 22 of the Nada Grocery and Vic's TV & Radio.

According to a report from the Colorado County Sheriff's department, Sidney Show, 27, of El Campo, was arrested August 19. He was released from jail under \$50,000 bond. The report said several items taken in the burglary were recovered, but the investigation still is continuing. Another El Campo man was arrested earlier this month.

In other news, the report said that Ruben Henneke reported that his residence on FM 949 had been burglarized. Entry was gained by forcing open the front door. A portable television, three shotguns and a rifle were stolen.

The two grants is similar to applications the city made in recent years. It could provide drainage, water and sewer line work in the Rice Mill neighborhood, which includes extending those lines toward the industrial foundation property at the corner of Prairie and FM 3013.

The smaller grant, however, is a new concept for the city. While not completely formulated, it could include a labor market study to tell new businesses what kind of labor force is available; provide a site plan for the industrial tract that would include information on the cost and location of streets and utilities, and could provide information, roughly called strategies and policies, that could be used by the city, the industrial foundation, the revitalization committee and the chamber of commerce working together to expand the tax and employment base here.

Applications for the larger grant can be made once each year, but the smaller grant can be sought each three months with a maximum of \$25,000 awarded.

Klockman said about \$56 million will be awarded state-wide in the first year of the program, with \$19 million already committed through previous federal programs. Applications are due September 1, and grant awards will be made around mid-October. Cities compete in regions for the money, with the governor appointing local officials within the regions to make the recommendations to the Texas Department of Community Affairs. That department then makes recommendations to the governor who makes the awards.

In addition to the state and local involvement in awarding the bids, the programs are aimed at the economic development of the low and moderate income families, which is one of the major criteria used in recommending which cities get the money.

Klockman said 57 percent of the families in Eagle Lake are in the low to moderate income groups. Those groups are families where the total annual income for a family of four is below \$17,356. The dollar limit changes as the family size changes.

Three Houston men have been connected with the burglary. They were arrested in Austin County in connection with an attempted burglary there. All three are still in jail, unable to post \$50,000 bond each. The sheriff said the stolen items were sold in Houston.

Also on August 17, Henry Rosenbaum, Jr., reported his mobile home on Schobee Road had been entered by forcing the front door open. A small amount of cash and some jewelry was stolen.

On August 19, Herbert Stern reported a theft at his residence on U.S. 90-A near the Colorado River bridge. According to the Sheriff's report, entry was gained through an unlocked rear door. Three rifles and a television were taken.

Less than an hour after Stern reported the burglary, the Austin County Sheriff's department called and reported the three men associated with the Rosenbaum burglary, had three shotguns and a television in their car. The merchandise was that taken from the Stern residence. The three Houston men were charged with that burglary.

Brighter soybean outlook

Earlier gloom regarding the soybean outlook has changed to improve price prospects for the 1983 crop. Factors brightening the soybean picture are a smaller than expected crop and dry weather in the Midwest that has dampened grain prospects, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, System.

U.S. soybean acreage is down 12 percent from earlier estimates, and yields will likely be down due to the dry weather. Furthermore, corn acreage is down sharply, so increased feed demands from expanding hog and poultry operations should boost soybean prices.

Dr. Cas Maree also emphasized such factors as adaptability and physical and structural soundness as critical to production economics. Cows should not have a beefy appearance while bulls should be capable of producing live fertile sperm, have a high level of sexual drive.

Select cattle for efficiency

Selecting cattle for functional efficiency — fertility, growthability and carcass quality — is the key to a profitable beef business, an official from the University of Pretoria, South Africa, said at the recent International Ranchers Roundup at San Angelo.
