Soft candlelight marked the setting for the nuptial area of the church. An immense thirty-branch candelabra was flanked by two ornate tree candelabra entwined with garlands of English ivy. The sanctuary was adorned with large Boston ferns and dreacene cornplants.

Former 4th grade teacher dies

Former Eagle Lake resident, Olive Swenson Reed, age 85, died Sunday at Polly Ryan Memorial Hospital in Rosenberg. Mrs. Reed was the widow of the late William Crawford Reed, the superintendent of Eagle Lake schools for over 30 years. She taught the fourth grade at Eagle Lake Elementary school for 15 years and was the salutatorian of Smithville High School in 1912.

Mrs. Reed was born on December 5, 1894 in Tyler County, a daughter of the late John and Mary Jane Swenson. She married Crawford Reed on July 22, 1917.

The couple lived in Rosebud, Texas for eight years before moving to Eagle Lake in 1925. Mrs. Reed received an education degree from the University of Houston in 1925. Following her husband's death in 1960 Mrs. Reed moved to Rosenberg to live with her daughter, Mrs. S. D. (Grace) Talley. She was a past matron of the Eagle Lake Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, while living in Eagle Lake she was involved in various civic groups.

She is survived by daughters, Grace Talley, Mrs. Charles W. (Jane) Frank of Houston; sons, W. C. Reed, Jr. of Houston, and Dr. James E. Reed of Gastonia of North Carolina; a sister, Mrs. D. S. (Helen) McDonald of Austin; 10 grandchildren; and five great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, August 23 at the First United Methodist Church in Rosenberg. Burial followed at 3 p.m. at Evan's Chapel in Leon County, Texas. Funeral arrangements were handled by Gramary and Carden Funeral Home.

James Henry, address not listed, was sentenced in District Court in Columbus on Monday to three years probation on charge of theft. He pled guilty, on April 7. He also was given a \$250 fine, and ordered to pay \$680 restitution and court costs.

The probation of three defendants was revoked Monday. Robert Perez, who was on probation after a burglary conviction, was sentenced to two years in the Texas Department of Corrections.

Kenneth Marvin Hemphill of Eagle Lake, also convicted of burglary, was sentenced to not less than two and not more than five years at a TDC unit. Israel Oliver, on probation on a conviction of possession of marijuana, was sentenced to 90 days in the Colorado County jail, and will continue on probation after release.
