

'Care about our city square' party



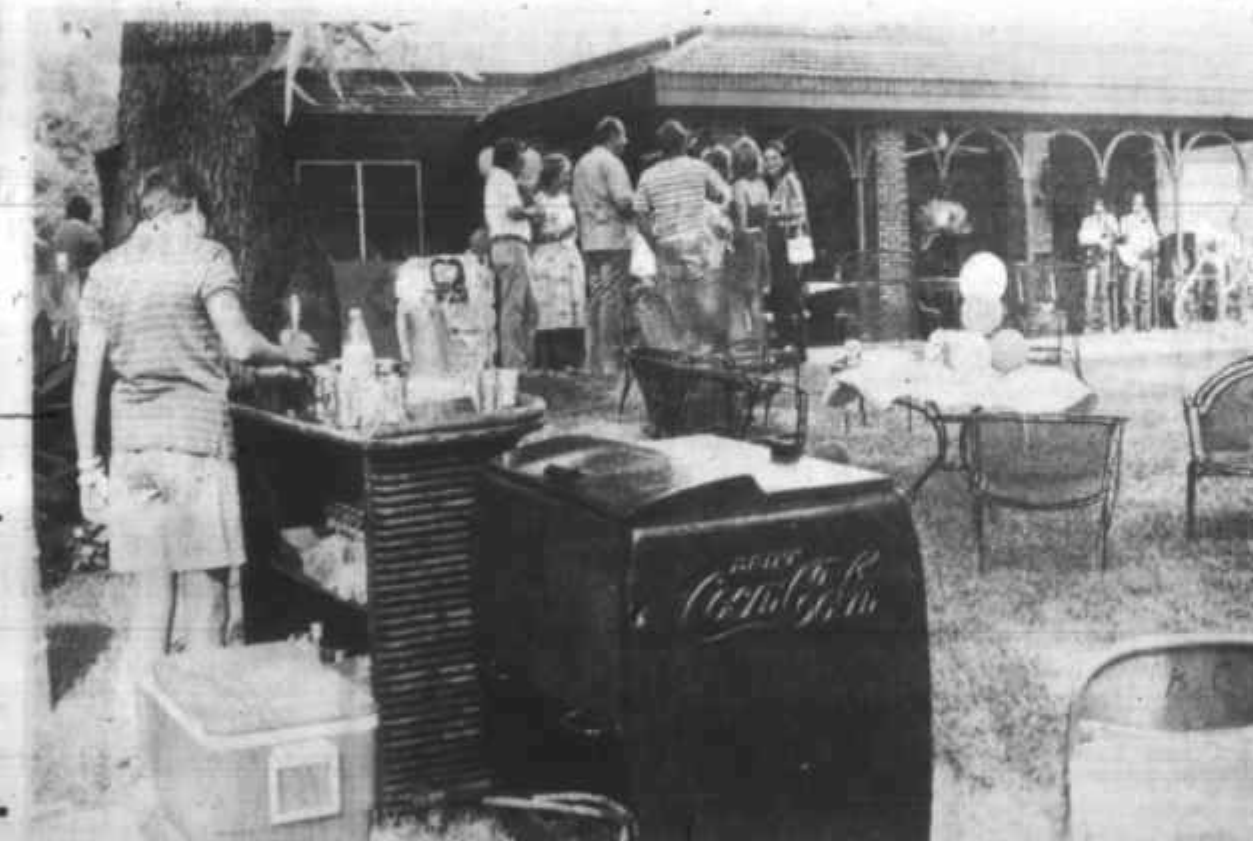
