Senior Mel Pratt will lead the offense at quarterback, with junior John Harborth ready to take over that position when needed.

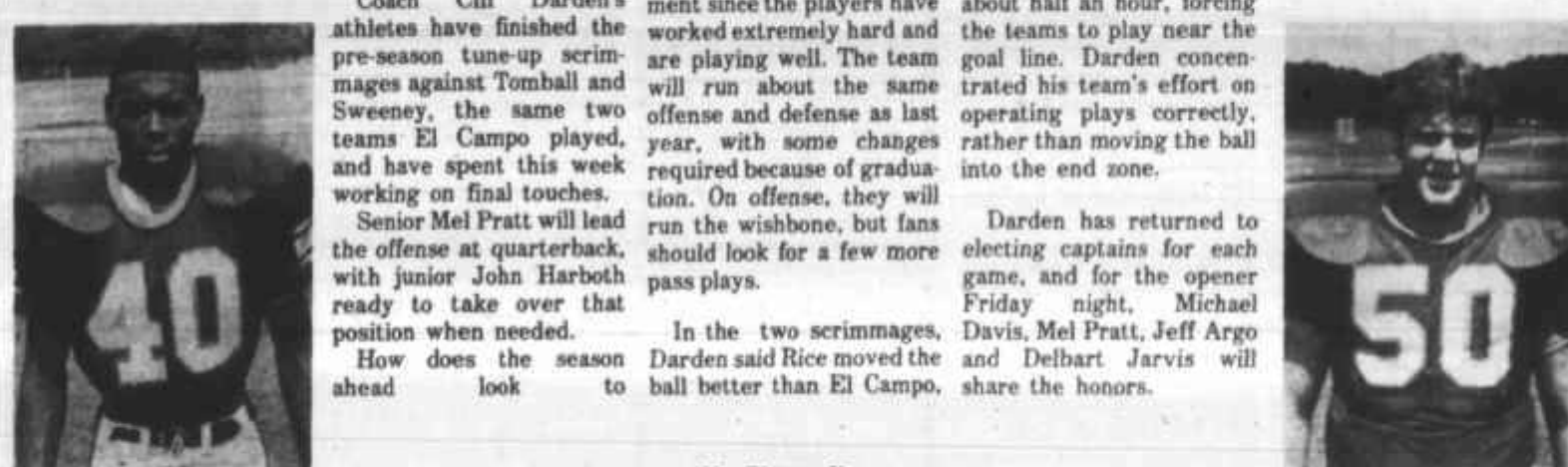

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During the regular mourning dove season the statewide daily bag limit is 12 doves, not to include more than two whitewings.

The mourning dove season opens September 1 in the Panhandle and Central Zones.

During the September 3-4 and 10-11 whitewing season in the special whitewing area of the Rio Grande Zone, hunters will be allowed to take 10 whitewings and 12 mourning doves per day. In the remainder of the Rio Grande Zone, the daily limit will be two whitewings plus 12 mourning doves during those two weekends.

Officials said that since this is the first time the daily bag limit will include white-winged doves outside the special four-day whitewing area, hunters may not be aware the stamp is required.

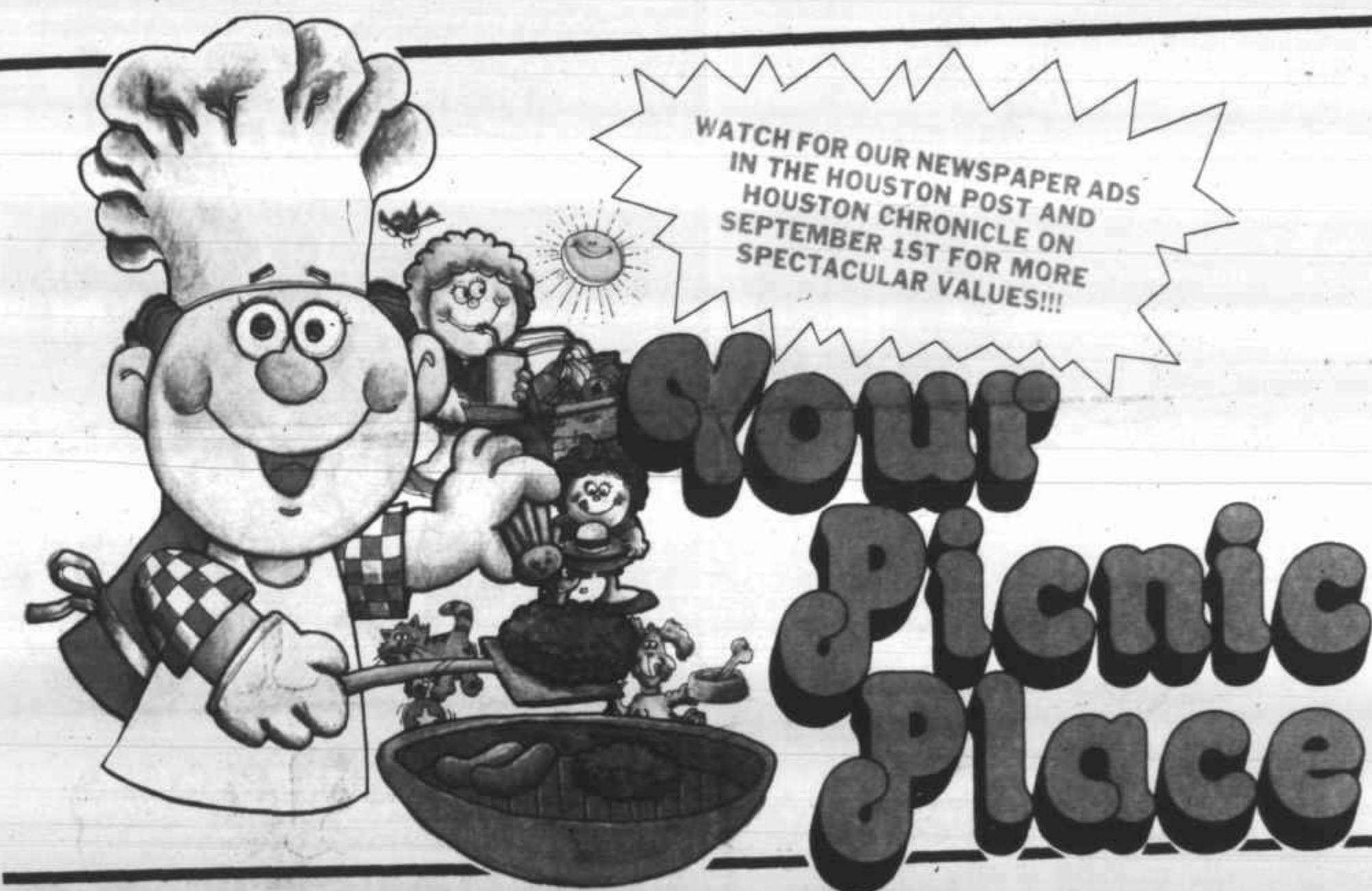
