Fishing, hunting licenses have been shipped to outlets

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials have announced that 1983-84 hunting and fishing licenses should now be available at department offices and at most retail outlets across the state.

All Texas hunting and fishing licenses expire on August 31 of each year. Resident hunting and fishing licenses are priced at \$5 each, and the resident combination hunting/fishing license is \$12.

Officials said the new hunting and fishing regulations guides also will be available at that time, including a map of the state's new three-zone alignment for dove hunting.

However, hunting regulations for 65 counties have not been adopted, and will not be included in the hunting regulations guide. The Parks and Wildlife Department adopted regulations for those counties on August 31, and a supplement with the new regulations will be distributed during September.

A supplement also will be distributed during September containing regulations for migratory waterfowl seasons.

Juniors and seniors prepare for ACT, SAT tests

As the new school year begins, more than one million high school juniors and seniors across the nation are preparing to participate in the ACT and SAT College Entrance Assessment Programs.

The ACT Assessment, which consists of four academic tests that measure educational development and a detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended or required by more than 2,700 postsecondary institutions and scholarship programs.

The SAT measures the verbal and mathematical abilities of the student that have been developed over many years, both in and out of school. The verbal questions test the student's vocabulary, verbal reasoning and understanding of what the student reads. The math questions test the student's ability to solve problems involving arithmetic, algebra and geometry.

On both the ACT and the SAT exams, all questions are multiple choice.

School guidance counselors recommend that students participate in the ACT Assessment Program during their junior year or early in their senior year. The SAT should be taken during the last half of their junior year or early in their senior year. Students taking these tests early will have their results available in time for use in planning for postsecondary education and career opportunities.

Students can obtain registration packets that contain all the information necessary to register and prepare for the College Assessment Exams from their high school counselors.

The basis registration fee for the ACT is \$9.50 and \$11.00 for the SAT.
