

## Axel, Williams on CCA board

Debra Gale Axel of Garwood and Martin N. Williams of Columbus have been selected to serve as representatives of Colorado County low-income residents on the Combined Community Action Board of Directors. Mrs. Axel will represent Precincts 1 and 2, and Mr. Williams will represent Precincts 3 and 4.

Persons seeking to serve on the CCA Board were required to submit a nomination letter, a letter of recommendation, and a petition signed by five low-income persons eligible to vote in the election. Mr. Williams and Mrs. Axel were the only qualified candidates for whom nomination petitions were submitted in their respective areas.

Mr. Williams is a school counselor, and has worked with the Combined Community Action Board of Directors. Mrs. Axel is a teacher at the Waldvogel Opportunity Center in Columbus, and is a member of Phi Beta Omega.

The election of these representatives will be certified by the CCA Board of Directors at the regular meeting on September 22 in Smithville. At this meeting, Mrs. Axel and Mr. Williams will take their seats on the Board, along with President B. Commissioner, Jerome Wicke, and Weimar Mayor, Thomas Brasher, who represent the Public Officials of the county.

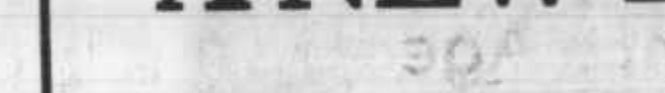
