Hempstead first district foe

Rice takes 2-1 tally into district

The Rice High School Raiders will take a 2-1 record into the football field next Friday night as they face Hempstead in their district opener. It should be a game that could tell the tale on whether this season's district play will be a successful one.

If last Friday night's game was a clue to the future, the road to a possible championship could lead in either direction. The number of points scored indicate district opponents should sharpen their defense. However, with 17 penalties against the Raiders and two lost fumbles, as was the case in the Needville game, the road could be short.

Hempstead's pre-district record is 1-2, but the Raiders need to prove past-history wrong and do something they have not been able to do in Hempstead—win. Waller, Bellville and Columbus again are the main district contenders.

Against Needville, the 1983 Raiders broke two team passing records. Quarterback Mel Pratt beat a record set in 1970 by throwing passes for 249 yards, surpassing the 186 yard effort by Darrell Pavlick playing against the John Foster Dulles Vikings. The other record was broken by Pratt and

reliever David Morgan together, with their combined passing yardage (295) surpassing the 235 yard team effort in 1979 against Waller.

Rice opened the game with four straight passes but fumbled deep in Needville territory. However, Needville returned the favor allowing Cleveland Scott to recover, and eventually score five plays later. Before two more minutes ran off the clock, Needville fumbled again. This time it took only four plays for the Raiders to score on a 26 yard run by Michael Davis, making it 13-0 in favor of Rice.

The second quarter saw the ball change hands eight times before another Rice touchdown that came after an 83-yard drive. Davis on a draw scored from 30 yards out, making it 19-0.

Needville then drove down to the Rice 11 before they were stopped when Rodney Parker intercepted a pass. Unable to move the ball, the Raiders punted, giving Needville good field position. A pass by Blue Jay quarterback Wade Dutey for 37 yards gave them their first score, and with a successful two-point conversion, made it 19-8 at the end of the first half.

When the second half opened, it appeared that Needville was trying to

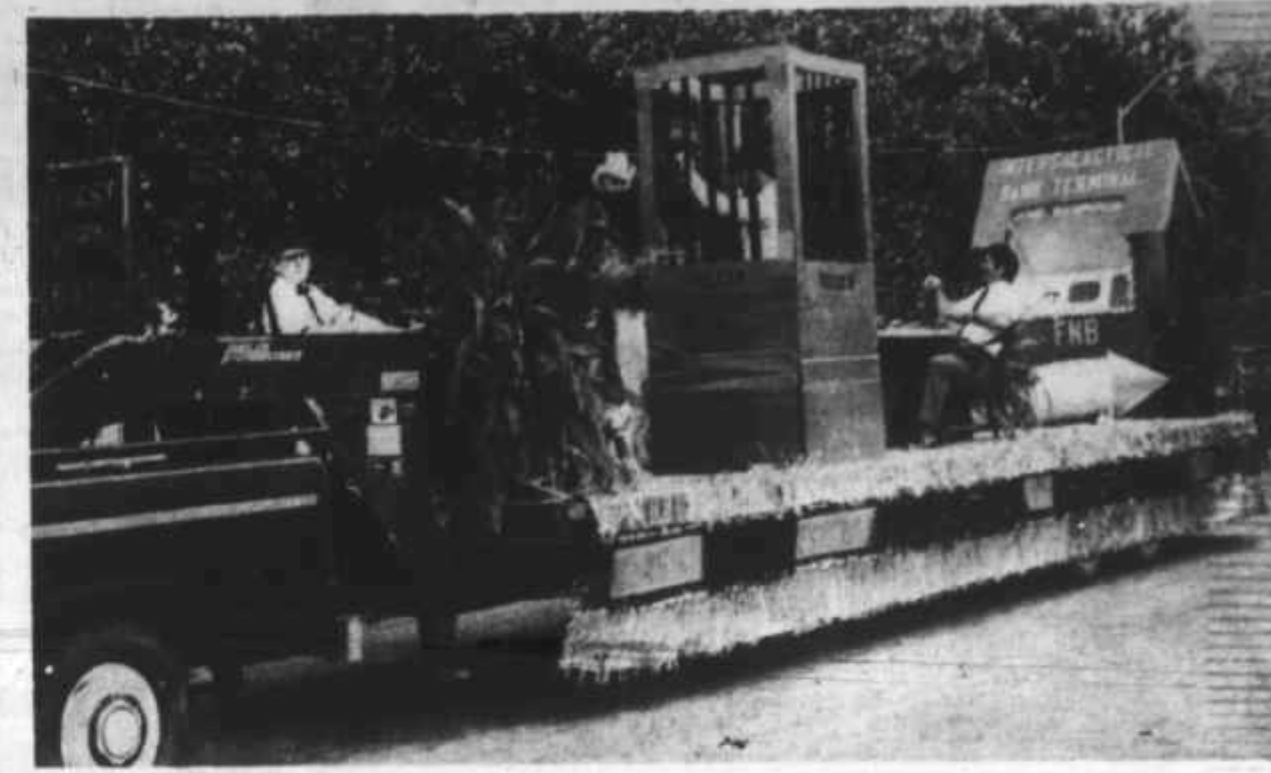
