United Way drive opens next week

The Eagle Lake area United Way fund campaign will kick off October 1, according to drive leaders Phyllis Thomas and Ernie Sommerlatte.

The United Way board met last week to study funding requests, and set campaign goals. This year's drive seeks to raise \$13,925, which is less than was donated the past two years, when the goal was \$12,000 each year.

The United Way drive here, formerly called The Consolidated Fund, supports various charitable efforts, with most of the money assisting local people and organizations. The thirteen organizations to be funded, the amount they received this year, and next year's proposed funding, are:

Boy Scout Troop 334, \$750; \$900; Boy Scout building fund, \$4,000; \$1,000; Campfire Girls, \$100; \$1,000; Eagle Lake Little League, \$500; \$1,000; local community relief, \$4,200; \$2,500; Little League regional improvements, \$1,000; \$1,000; Salvation Army, \$1,784; \$1,500; Eagle Lake Community Center, \$500; \$500; Colorado County mental health and mental retardation, \$1,000; \$1,000; Red Cross, \$1,300; \$1,000; Warm Springs Rehabilitation Hospital in Gonzales, \$250; \$100; 4-County Council on Alcoholism, \$250; \$750; M. D. Anderson Cancer Research, \$1,000; \$750.

USO, \$135; \$125, and for local administrative expenses, \$615; \$800. (Note: In year's past, when donations exceeded goals, additional funds were allotted to local relief, therefore, local relief this year was budgeted the same as previous years, except last year's figure represents the additional funds added after the campaign.)

In making its funding decision, the local board leaned toward increasing funding for strictly local organizations either through the slight increase in campaign funds, or by decreasing those organizations not located in Eagle Lake. And, although the campaign goal is increased by 16 percent, it is still below the \$15,000 the community donated last year.

Thomas and Sommerlatte said this year's drive will be handled much in the same way as the drive last fall, in that Lions Club and Rotary Club members will be distributing United Way packets to prospective donors the first week of October. They also will be responsible for re-contacting the same people, and picking the packets up for return to the United Way leaders. Those packets include United Way information and the pledge card to be returned when a donation is made.

Although many people return a check with their card to cover their total donation, some companies

and individuals make pledges, then send the United Way a check on a regular basis, such as monthly or quarterly.

Names of donors, unless they ask to be omitted, will be listed intermittently in The Headlight in October and November. Special note will be given to donors when all employees of that business make donations or pledges.

New officers for United Way for 1983 are Bill Harrison Jr., president;

Dam meeting October 3

A public meeting on the Colorado Coastal Plains Project is scheduled for Monday, October 3, at 7 p.m., to be held in Columbus, in the Veterans Community Center, 1349 Walnut.

The study is being conducted by the Bureau of Reclamation in cooperation with the Lower Colorado River Authority and the Texas Department of Water Resources. The purpose of the study is to determine the feasibility of constructing a dam and reservoir on the lower Colorado River between La Grange and Columbus.

The primary purpose of the meeting is to present preliminary information developed since the study began in March 1983. General damsite location and various reservoir sizes, with corresponding acres of land affected, will be major topics of discussion.

In addition, the meeting will provide an opportunity for those who wish to select local citizen representatives to serve on the citizens' advisory committee. Several state and local elected officials or their representatives are presently on the committee.
