Centennial Showcase held October 1 at UT

From architecture designs to archeological finds, from a brass ensemble fanfare to football films, the University of Texas at Austin will highlight the best of its programs October 1 in Centennial Showcase, a university-wide exposition showing the institution at its 100th anniversary milestone. More than 250 activities will take place on the Austin campus from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m., allowing visitors to see the programs that have contributed to the national status of UT Austin as an institution of higher education.

Centennial Showcase offers a wide array of tours, exhibitions, performances, demonstrations, mini-lectures, media presentations, athletic events and other activities sponsored by each of the academic units on campus and by administrative offices.

Admission is free, and special parking facilities will be provided for the outlying Austin area to bring visitors to UT for the day. Shuttles will begin operating at 9:30 a.m. between the campus and parking areas at Nelson Field, Camp Mabry, Toney Burger Field and the Capitol Complex. At frequent intervals, the buses will bring visitors to special information centers where Showcase programs listing events of the day will be available.

Campus shuttle systems will carry guests around the more than 300 acres that make up the UT Austin campus. Food and beverages may be purchased during the day from numerous food stations located across the campus.

Visitors may elect to watch an architecture design contest or tour the George Kosmetzky Center for Business Education which incorporates state-of-the-art instructional facilities. While students of the College of Fine Arts perform in music, dance and drama groups across campus, the UT General Libraries will dust off old football films of UT championship victories.

At the UT Austin Humanities Research Center, visitors may view the center's extensive collections, including the Gutenberg Bible owned by UT, then present their own
