## ICT teaches skills

The Industrial Cooperative Training program is a cooperative relationship between employers of the community and Rice High School. Employers hire students to work parttime at wage rates equitable for beginning young employees and provide them with on-the-job training. The ICT program of Rice High School is instructed by Jerry Hajovsky.

The ICT program consists of a combination of occupationally-related classroom instruction and on-the-job training. It is an effective program which prepares students for gainful employment after graduation.

## Industrial Cooperative Training

High school students 16 years of age or older who are of junior or senior classification are eligible to enter the program, provided they have an interest in and a vocational need for such training.

Acceptance for participation is on the basis of training objective aptitude, interest, need, physical and mental competence, and other qualifications essential to successful employment.

## \$1,500 scholarships to be awarded

The College Board, with a grant from the Andrew Mellon Foundation, will award college scholarships of \$1,500 each over the next three years to 1,100 Hispanic high school seniors who demonstrate outstanding achievement, plus an equal number of \$100 honorable mention awards.

The board said its National Hispanic Scholars Awards Program is intended to focus renewed attention on the academic preparation of all Hispanic high school students, and to encourage their recruitment by institutions of higher education.

Hispanics make up 6.5 percent of the U.S. population, but only 3.9 percent of total enrollments in higher education, the board said.

In 1984-85, the year the College Board program is slated to begin, approximately 250 nonrenewable \$1,500 scholarships will be awarded, followed by 350 in 1985-86, and 500 in 1986-87. Two hundred and fifty honorable mention awards will be made the first year, 350 the second year and 500 in 1986-87.

On the basis of the scores on the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT) administered by the College Board, high school juniors who identify themselves as Hispanic will be invited to apply for awards, and winners will be chosen on the basis of their scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and other criteria.

The college board also administers an annual Outstanding Talent Roster of Outstanding Minority Community College Graduates; an engineering scholarship program for minority community college graduates; and Minorities in Engineering, which encourages minority high school students who make certain scores on the PSAT or SAT to enter technical careers.

## More college scholarships to be awarded

The Hyde and Bellingrath Scholarships, Southwestern's highest awards, recognize young men and women who represent exceptional academic achievement and distinctive personal accomplishment. Renewable annually, the Scholarships provide full tuition, room and board, an estimated \$41,000 over the next four years.

The Hyde Scholarships, established in 1973, are the gift of the J. R. Hyde Foundation, Inc. of Memphis. The Bellingrath Scholarships honor the late Walter D. Bellingrath, Mobile, Alabama, who established the Bellingrath-Morse Foundation of which Southwestern at Memphis is a major beneficiary.

The college Scholarship Committee will consider candidates nominated on the basis of academic record, leadership record, character and personality, and personal achievement.

All nominations must be received by January 15. To be eligible to compete for the Scholarship, the nominated student must apply for admission to the college not later than February 1. The admission application and other information will be sent to the student upon receipt of his or her nomination. Finalists will be announced on March 15. Final candidates will be invited as guests of the college to participate in final interviews at Southwestern in mid-March. Winners will be announced by April 15.
