The development of successful volunteer leadership depends on seven basic steps: identifying people with needed skills and attitudes, selecting people for specific positions, orienting them so they know what is expected of them, training them properly, using them properly so that they have an opportunity to function, recognizing sound performance, and evaluating performance and providing feedback. Volunteer recruitment should be on a personal basis and should relate to specific jobs and needs, says A-H and youth specialist with Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

• Heard a letter read by Judge Crankner from Governor Mark White. Crankner has been appointed one of three county judges to investigate the state task force looking into the problems of indigent health care. The task force is to look into four areas: who is at risk and what eligibility criteria should be applied to get services; how to coordinate services to be provided; bids for a used backhoe for Precinct 8. • Agreed to advertise for bids for fire insurance on county-owned buildings.

• Gave Judge Crankner permission to investigate the costs of righting the dome of the courthouse. Because of dangerous wiring, the lights were turned out two years before the courthouse was renovated.

Rice High School seniors are being encouraged to compete for a \$3,000 four-year college scholarship and an NCR personal computer that will be awarded to the top approximately 100 students throughout the country.

The scholarships and personal computers are being offered through the NCR National Scholars Program, established by NCR Corporation as part of the company's 100th anniversary celebration for 1984.

The program provides an opportunity for two seniors (one male and one female) in each state to win a \$750 cash scholarship for each of four years of college and a personal computer. The NCR personal computer valued at more than \$3,000.

Winners will be selected from a two-stage screening process. The first stage will require students to rewrite and self-score a descriptive information released to that Program from the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) of the College Board's Admissions Testing Program or from the ACT Assessment Test. The ACT Assessment will be used for the first screening. A small number of participants (approximately 25 males and 25 females) will be designated as finalists as a result of this first screening.

Seniors who meet the selection criteria are encouraged to have their SAT or ACT results submitted for consideration:

- Cumulative secondary school grade point average of 3.0 or better in all grades of B plus or A minus or better; and
- High scores on standardized tests such as the SAT or ACT; and
- High ranking in the top 10 percent; and
- Significant personal accomplishments in school and community activities.

"Seniors who wish to be considered for the NCR National Scholars Program must authorize the release of their SAT or ACT test results, and they must do so by Friday, November 11," stated Fred W. Smith, NCR High School. "Guidance counselors have details on how to do this, as well as answers to other questions about the program. I urge all seniors to contact their counselor right away."

In the second stage of selection, those seniors who are designated finalists are interviewed to provide detailed biographical information, secondary school transcripts, and recommendations. An independent committee of advisors and professionals will select winners based on

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The Railroad Commission has announced changes in the method producers must use to report gas well deliverabilities and the way gas purchasers must file nominations for amounts of gas to be purchased.

The changes were announced in a letter to all gas producers, gatherers, and purchasers which said the new measures are "part of the Railroad Commission's response to the declining market for national gas and its effort to insure that the market is fairly and properly allocated among the various gas producers in the state."

The Commission also indicated that the new procedures would be incorporated in proposed changes to its statewide rules that would be published for public comment.

Changes have been made to the Commission's G-10 form used by operators to report gas well deliverability tests. The new form adds a space for signature by a representative of the company purchasing the well's gas.

When signed by the producer and gas purchaser, the form certifies that both agree that the test is an accurate indication of the well's deliverability.

A purchaser's representation is not required to actually witness the test; but they must be permitted to do so if they desire. If a producer and a purchaser can't agree on test results, the producer must contact the appropriate Commission district office and arrange for a Commission employee to witness a test.

Tests to be performed in November, December and January must be reported on the new form. Operators are required to test the majority of the gas wells in the state twice a year.

Also on the revised form, gas purchasers must indicate the amount of gas nominated to be purchased from each field as a percentage of the total deliverability of all wells from which they purchase gas in that field. The new percentage figure will be required beginning with nominations for November purchases.

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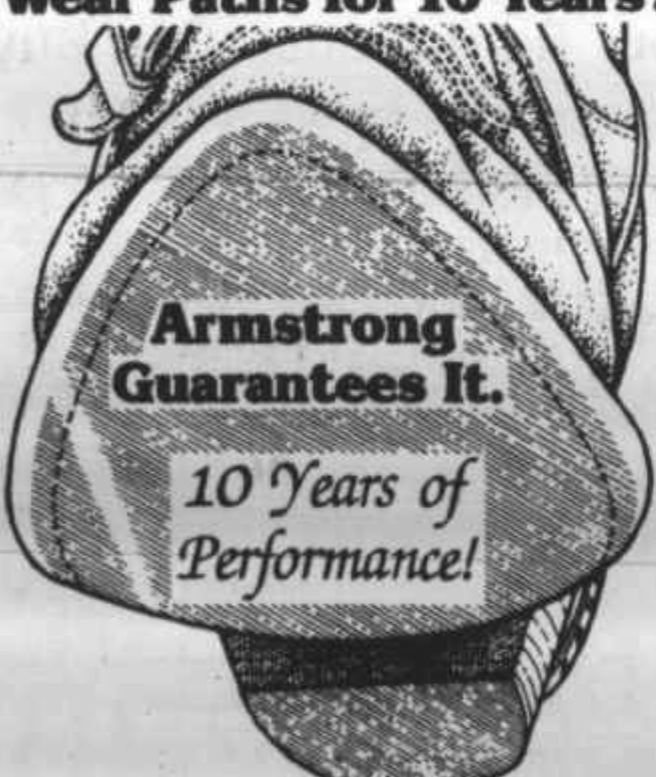
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The Texas State Library System has notified the Eola and David Winterman Library for the year September 1, 1983 to August 31, 1984.
