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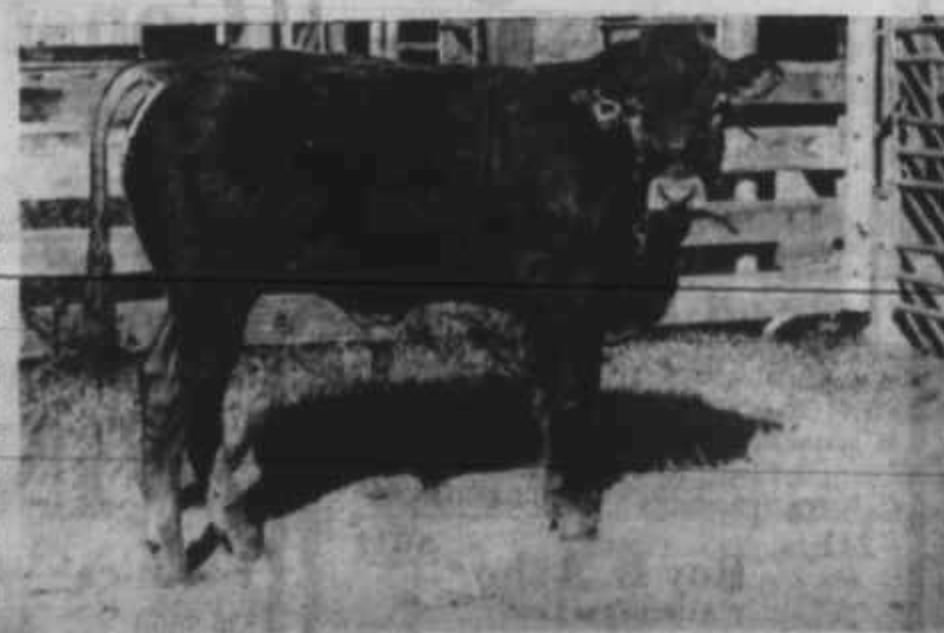

Raiders lose 44-14

The Rice Raider offense couldn't get its scoring machine in motion until late in the game Friday, and the strong Waller offense pushed its way into the endzone too many times, handing the Raiders a 44-14 defeat.

The Raider passing game, or lack of it, killed Rice's chances, with Mel Pratt and David Morgan sharing quarterback duties. The two hit only three passes out of 19 attempts, when many times this season, Pratt finished games with a 50 percent completion record.

Elsewhere around the district Friday night, Brookshire Royal kept its perfect record by beating LaGrange 21-7. In Columbus, the Cardinals barely made it past Hempstead—7-6. Sealy remained winless in district play as it lost 40-0 at Seville.

With only three games left in district play, it looks like this year's schedule was put together with advance knowledge of who the strong teams would be. A week from this Friday night, number one Brookshire faces number two Waller. The Raiders face Royal this Friday for homecoming. Columbus the following Friday, then close the season against Seville in Raider Stadium.

Although Columbus is 3-1 in District play and Rice 1-2-1, last Friday's action might mean the two teams are fairly closely matched, since Rice played Hempstead in a scoreless tie and the Cardinals were only able to beat Hempstead with an extra point kick. The Waller-Royal game will be the one to watch.

The demise of the Raiders in Waller came early, as Waller tossed a long pass that was caught

far down field. They took a punt on for a score, and never let up. However, at the half Waller led by only 16 points.

Rice opened the second half receiving the ball, but gave it up on a fumble. Waller ran two plays, the second going for 27 yards and a score.

The Raider defense got tough after the offense punted, and although Waller scored again, it took them 12 plays to go 61 yards in six minutes. The third quarter ended with Waller scoring again, making it 38-0.

Rice continued its offense with Morgan at the helm, and 10 plays later had moved the ball to the Waller 1 1/2 yard line with some spectacular plays. In one, a fake punt allowed Michael Davis to rush for 25 yards, but the team lost 15 yards on a personal foul. With the ball on the Waller 11, the Raiders suffered a nine-yard loss. However, Davis made up for it and gained 10 on the next play. Then, coach Clifton Darden called a double reverse, to move the ball close, and a first down. Mel Pratt came back in to hand off to Davis again, for the score. Pratt threw to James Amos

for the two-point conversion. Before Waller could score again, Rice, led by Morgan, maneuvered into scoring range on the Waller 13. Morgan moved to another position and Pratt came on to throw him a scoring pass. The extra point pass was incomplete to end Rice's scoring for the night.

The Raiders kept on trying. On the kickoff, the entire right side of the team shifted left for an on-sides kick, but the ball traveled too far. Waller fumbled on their next play from scrimmage, but it didn't help. The Raiders gave the ball over on downs, and with a minute and 36 seconds on the clock, Waller scored for its last time of the game, making the final 44-14.

The Raiders finished the night with only 160 yards on the ground, and Davis and Morgan each had 54 yards. Waller rushed for 380 yards, including 124 by Malcolm Walker.

Davis, for his career at Rice, has 569 yards on the ground, and ranks 6th among all Rice players. Rob Johnson holds the lead in that statistic, but Davis could move into second or third position.

The scores listed in Sunday's Houston Chronicle almost caused an error in judging this week's Headlight football contest.
