## Rice, Royal boys still top district; Royal girls on top; Hempstead loses

The Rice Raider boys varsity basketball team and the Royal boys both won their district contests Friday and this Tuesday night, to continue to share the lead in District 24-3A play, with identical 6-1 records.

For the girls, Royal remains undefeated at 9-0, while Hempstead lost to Sealy Tuesday night 49-41. The Sealy girls now are in third place with a 6-3 record while Hempstead holds to second with a 7-2 record.

The Rice girls overwhelmed the Waller girls on Tuesday night, by a score of 63-38. However, they lost last Friday night to Hempstead 65-45.

In last Friday's win over Hempstead, the Raider boys won by a wide margin, 68-37. Jarvis lead Raider scoring with 21 points, while Pope tossed in 16. Raider free-throw shooting improved, hitting eight of ten.

Tuesday night at Waller, both Parker and Jarvis hit for 15, to lead the team to its 50-39 win. The Raider's good defense showed, up at the half, when they lead 23-12. The fourth quarter was the high-point quarter, when Rice scored 21 to Waller's 19.

**Friday's schedule:** Rice travels to LaGrange; Columbus is at Royal, Waller is at Sealy, and Hempstead is at Bellville. The girls play the same schools, but the travel schedule is reversed, so Rice will face LaGrange girls in Raider Gym.

**Friday, Tuesday results:** Scores last Friday night for the boys were Hempstead 38 at Rice 67; Bellville 58 at Columbus 75; Waller 43 at LaGrange 66, and Royal 53 at Sealy 44. Tuesday night, the boys scores were LaGrange 57 at Columbus 70; Rice 50 at Waller 39; Royal 52 at Bellville 33, and Sealy 51 at Hempstead. For the girls, Waller 38 at Rice 63; Columbus 37 at LaGrange 50; Bellville 32 at Royal 79, and Hempstead 41 at Sealy 43.

## Rice High School to hold pre-registration

The Rice High School Guidance and Counseling Staff will be conducting pre-registration of classes for the 1984-85 school year in the coming weeks.

The Rice High School principal, Fred Grahmann, will be conducting an orientation for eight grade students as part of the pre-registration process. Mr. Grahmann will briefly inform students of the high school's rules and regulations, what is expected of high school students as far as behavior, school activities and opportunities, and classwork. The counselors, Guy Beane and D. R. Wright, will pre-register students for courses of study that the students select for their 1984-85 freshman year of high school. Parents are being asked to attend the pre-registration sessions so they can participate in the planning of their child's educational goals and needs, and to complete the necessary school records.

### Man dead on arrival at hospital

Manuel Mendoza Ebarra, 39, of 310 East Fourth St., Eagle Lake, was dead on arrival Tuesday at Eagle Lake Community hospital after being picked up about 11:25 a.m. at his home by the Eagle Lake Ambulance Corps.

According to the ambulance corps, Ebarra's family said he had been ill for several days. Bill and Emily Stiles were on ambulance duty and when they arrived at the home, they said the man's color was good and his eyes were not dilated. However, vital signs were so weak they were difficult to find. Mrs. Stiles began administering cardio-pulmonary resuscitation, which continued on the way to the hospital.

In other police news, a small pistol was reported missing Sunday, by its owner, Charles Foster, 50, of the 300 block of Union St. The police report indicated that no charges were to be filed. The gun, valued at about \$65, was missing from a chest of drawers.

Victor L. Rodriguez, of the 400 block of Lake St., was arrested Sunday for unlawfully carrying a weapon (a pistol), public intoxication, backing unsafely, no driver's license, no insurance, and failure to drive in a single marked lane. He posted \$2,000 bond for the weapon charge, and paid a cash deposit of \$232.50 on the other charges.

A passenger in the vehicle, Georgio Pantoga, 43, of Eagle Lake, paid a cash deposit of \$44 on a public intoxication charge.

The men were arrested by Chief Gil Steen, who stopped their vehicle for the traffic violations. When Steen pulled the men over, the Rodriguez vehicle backed into the city patrol car, but no damage was reported.

## Families can make transition to home easier

Moving an elderly relative into a nursing home can produce a family crisis. "Whether the move is initiated by the older person or family members, it brings to the surface all the mixed feelings that characterize close human relationships," says Judith L. Warren, a family life education-aging specialist.

With the move to an institution, all family members become aware of the older person's declining health and the fact it is probably the last move he or she will make, says Warren, who is with the Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service home economics program.

In this difficult situation, many adult children may have the impulse to retreat. Yet research indicates that the best thing families can do is to stay close. At least one family member should spend the entire first day at the home and daily visits by as many family members as possible should be made for the first two weeks. After that, continued contact

through visits, phone calls and notes will demonstrate the adult children's commitment and reduce their parent's fears of abandonment, says Warren.

## Look for home for 'family'

Before admitting an elderly relative to a nursing home, carefully select an institution that encourages the maintenance of family ties, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

Check the nursing home policies and facilities to see if it has open visiting hours, provides facilities like coffee shops and lounges where families can spend time together, encourages families to bring special food treats and reduces obstacles for visits to relatives' homes which encourage family closeness.
