

Man for man, including Bill Appelt, they told the legislators that steel shot was as detrimental to the birds as it was to the businesses.

The session was held to assess the effects of the first season of steel shot use on the Gulf Coast, and to give local hunters and local conservationists the opportunity to tell their stories. Biologists presented facts related their experiences.

With steel shot, he said, a hunter has to shoot at maybe 25 to 30 percent more birds in order to get the same number in the bag. But early in the morning, there is no way to do that...consequently kills have been very low this year."
