The screening will be set up at the Sheridan Community Center and will last from 3 p.m. until 6:30 p.m.

This screening is a Lions Club service project provided by Lions all over the world to help inform the public of the dangers of diabetes and high blood pressure. Its main goal is to determine whether or not you have one or both of the above disorders, and if so, help point you in the proper direction for adequate help.

Diabetes kills more Americans every year than all other groups of diseases except cancer and heart disorders. Today more than 11,000,000 people are afflicted with the disease. Diabetes is now the leading cause of new cases of blindness in Americans aged 20-74. If you or someone you know has diabetes, contact the American Diabetes Association, Greater Houston Chapter, 6405 Richmond Ave., Houston, Texas, 1-713-978-7660, or write to the American Diabetes Association, 200 N. Peak Avenue, New York, New York, 10016, telephone 1-212-683-7444.

This screening is set up to detect these illnesses but we would like for those people who already know they have diabetes or high blood pressure to come by and sign up so the Lions may get your name on a mailing list with the American Diabetes Association. This list could also be used by our local Ambulance Corps informing them who might have a possible diabetic coma, go into insulin shock, or risk a great danger of having a cardiac arrest.

This is our second diabetes and hypertension screening and we are in hopes that everyone will get out and take advantage of this very worthwhile project.
