Farm Bureau Week, 1 year free membership

The week of February 13-17 is part of a statewide observance during which county Farm Bureaus will make a special effort to enroll new members, according to Bob Stallman of Columbus, president of the Colorado County Farm Bureau.

Leon Hattermann of Weimar is chairman of the membership committee which is responsible for membership acquisition and maintenance. Other committee members are: Billy Hefner of Garwood and Theo. Schultz of Fayetteville.

"The Texas Farm Bureau, with more than 300,000 member families on its membership rolls, is the largest state Farm Bureau in the nation," the proclamation reads.

"The Farm Bureau is a grass-roots organization, and its foundation is the county Farm Bureau. There are 216 organized county Farm Bureaus in the state, including the Colorado County Farm Bureau," the proclamation states.

Bob Stallman said the local county Farm Bureau has 2,142 member families and is seeking to exceed that figure in 1984.

During February 13th through February 17th, Colorado County Farm Bureau will offer one year's free membership for the first 10 new farm or ranch families that sign up for membership. To qualify for the one year's free membership there must be 50 percent gross income from agriculture for that family.

Health risk

A "health risk appraisal" - simply a short paper and pencil test - can help analyze your lifestyle, says a Texas A&M University health educator.

The test contains questions about eating and exercise habits, alcohol and drug consumption, stress level and safety habits. You then score the test to determine the degree to which you are risking your health. The National Health Information Clearinghouse will send a free "Health Style" test if you write to P.O. Box 1153, Washington, D.C. 20013.

Pre-hearing conference on coal slurry pipeline application

A panel of Railroad Commission examiners yesterday made February 17 the deadline for briefs from all interested parties concerning issues involved in the application of Energy Transportation Systems, Inc. to build a coal slurry pipeline in the state. It would cross Colorado County.

The examiners decided on the deadline after meeting in a day-long pre-hearing conference with proponents and opponents of the pipeline project. The session was scheduled to receive comment on procedures the Commission will follow in processing the application and determining the parties and issues in the case.

After considering the points made at the conference and in the briefs, the examiners will issue an order identifying the parties to the case, developing a system of procedural steps and deadlines necessary to process the application, and scheduling hearings on the matter.

State law requires that the Railroad Commission issue a certificate of public convenience and necessity to a company before it can build a coal transportation pipeline in Texas. ETSI filed its application for such a certificate on December 13, 1983.

The ETSI application is the first application for a coal slurry pipeline the Commission has received since the Texas Legislature gave it jurisdiction over such lines in 1977.
