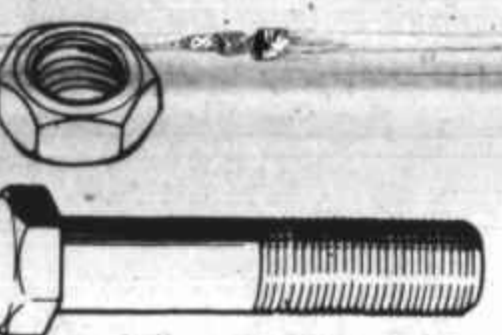
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Is this someone you know?

Free immunization clinic at Ugarte Clinic this Thursday

The Free Immunization Clinic sponsored by the Texas Department of Health will be held this Thursday, February 9 from 1 to 4 p.m. at the Ugarte Clinic in Eagle Lake. Immunizations for Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis (DTP), Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella will be given to infants, pre-schoolers, and school-age children. Tetanus and/or Diphtheria will be given to adults.

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Recipe of the Week Submitted by Annie Henneke Five-Layer Meal 1 (28-ounce) can whole tomatoes 1 lb. ground beef 2/3 cup chopped onion 1 tsp. salt 2 tps. chili powder 1/4 tsp. pepper 3 large potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced 1 cup uncooked regular rice 2/3 cup chopped green pepper 1/4 cup catsup Drain tomatoes, reserving juice. Chop tomatoes; set aside. Cook ground beef and onion until beef is browned, stirring often to crumble meat; drain off drippings. Add salt, chili powder, and pepper. Place potatoes in a greased 13 x 9 x 2 inch baking dish; sprinkle with rice. Top with ground beef mixture and green pepper. Combine reserved tomato juice and catsup; pour over casserole. Top with potatoes. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for about 1 hour or until potatoes are tender. Yield: 6 to 8 servings.
