**Munson draws campaign foe**

Two attorneys have announced their candidacy for district attorney for the 25th Judicial District which includes Colorado, Gonzales, Guadalupe and Lavaca counties. The incumbent, Houston Munson of Gonzales, is seeking reelection and W.C. "Bud" Kirkendall of Sealing is announcing his candidacy. Kirkendall, in a brochure, believes that repeated offenders of a crime must be prosecuted aggressively. He refers to those who commit acts of violence, and who burglarize homes, must not be treated leniently. "Anyone violating the law in this district should accept the responsibility and consequences for his actions," said Kirkendall. He believes that plea bargaining and pleading guilty to a lesser offense should be reserved for exceptional cases. "Fairness to society and the victim should be the guide, not expediency and court efficiency," said Kirkendall. Munson has been 25th Judicial District Attorney for the past 13 years. **Two arrested in burglaries last week**

The incident is currently under investigation.

Excellent agricultural weather will dominate the Coastal Plains for most of the rest of the week. There could be showers near the end of the week. The spring wheat harvest is well advanced. It is expected that the yield will be good. The growth of small grains and native grass pastures. This is good news for ranchers who face low hay supplies. Winter grain miles could be causing problems, so keep a watchful eye on pest activity. Feeding remains necessary because rations are still chilly. Calves, lambs, and weak animals need nighttime shelter, especially in inland counties where temperatures will drop to the upper thirties the next two nights.
