Electrolysis available at Wharton Clinic

Electrolysis, the only safe and permanent process to remove unwanted hair, is available in Wharton at the Outlar and Blair Clinic. A trained electrologist, Hillary Vonderau, is providing the service under the medical supervision of Dr. Ronald Cochran, the Dermatologist supervising the electrolysis program at the Outlar and Blair Clinic. A method of removing unwanted hair are, for women, the upper lip, chin, hairline, eyebrows, and bikini line. Men are also using electrolysis to remove painful ingrown hairs, shape-beard lines, and eyebrows. Lighten hair, beard and reduce excessive back and chest hair growth.

Electrolysis works by inserting a thin probe in the space from which the hair grows. A slight electric current dries out and destroys the hair root allowing the hair to be easily removed. A newly developed insulated probe is used to protect the skin and reduce the length of treatment.

"Electrolysis is not an overnight process," explains Ms. Vonderau. "Since 20 percent of all our hair roots are dormant at a given time, we must wait until those hairs reappear to permanently remove them." Also, thick or coarse hair requires a longer period of treatment. An initial free consultation can provide answers to the
