Ag sign-up period changed; fallow rules are revised

The sign-up period for cotton, feed grain, rice and wheat program have been extended through March 16, and summer fallow rules have been changed, according to John R. Block, U.S. secretary of agriculture.
The summer fallow rules have been changed so that the requirements would be the same as they were in 1983 and during previous years. Prior to this action, acreage designated for the 1984 programs could not have been land intended for summer fallow in the current year. Other provisions of the 1984 program will remain unchanged, Block said.
These actions should clear away some of the obstacles which made it difficult for farmers to make sound decisions about the program, Block said. Also, many farmers have not been able to finalize crop operating plans including financing and lease arrangements.
Since producers must sign a binding contract in the 1984 acreage reduction program, with liquidated damages for failure to comply, they are reluctant to sign up until their operating plans are more complete, Block said.
"Both USDA and private sector analysts say that when most farmers compare these programs with their own operating plans, they will find participation to be in their advantage," Block said. "This extension will give producers time needed to weigh benefits of participation against the risks of no price protection which they would otherwise face."
Block encourages farmers to avoid a last-minute rush to USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation county offices so each farmer can be better served.

County commissioners meet

Ontiveros planning Columbus ambulance service

Thomas Ontiveros of Columbus is making preliminary efforts to form an ambulance service in that area since Braden Ambulance Service stopped service in January.
Ontiveros met with the Colorado County commissioners court on Monday to ask if they would make up the difference in payment from patients that are unable to pay, or if an insurance company only makes a partial payment.
Court member Bill Stiles proposed having the ambulance service request doctors signatures stating the patient must be moved by an ambulance to avoid unnecessary transfers and costs. Taxpayers do not need to pay for someone that doesn't need to be transferred by an ambulance, Stiles said.
Judge Lester Cranek said the court has no interest in guaranteeing the payment of any non-paid bills at this time.
Commissioners approved April 9 as the opening date for bids for three ambulance units for Columbus, Eagle Lake and Weimar. The specifications for Columbus and Eagle Lake will be considered together.
In other business, commissioners will, over Wayne Vinton of Weimar, to become a special trapper. The vote was 4-2. Vinton would like to trap in areas where there are special problems. Currently there are five trappers.
