

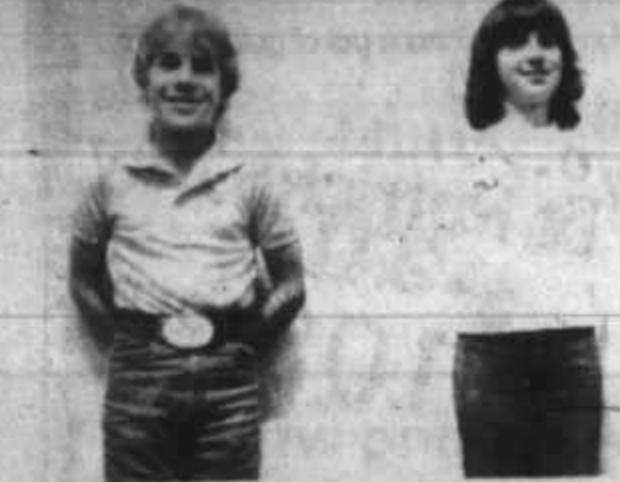
### Sheridan PTS open house, BBQ is successful
