Recipe of the Week



Brownie Melaways

1 package (2.15 ounces) Betty Crocker fudge brownie mix
1/2 cup flaked coconut
1/2 cup chopped nuts
3 cups powdered sugar
1/2 cup margarine or butter, softened
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
About 2 tablespoons milk

2 squares (1 ounce each) unsweetened chocolate
2 teaspoons margarine or butter

Heat oven to 350 degree. Prepare brownies as directed on package except —

stir coconut and nuts into dough. Bake as directed; cool.

Mix powdered sugar, 1/2 cup margarine and the vanilla. Stir in milk, 1 teaspoon at a time, until spreading consistency; spread over brownies. Refrigerate until topping is firm, about 30 minutes. Heat chocolate and 2 teaspoons margarine until melted. Drizzle evenly over topping; spread evenly. Refrigerate until chocolate is firm, about 15 minutes. Cut as directed on package. Store in refrigerator.

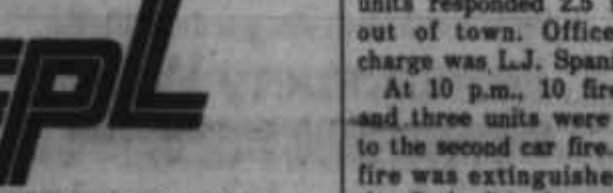
