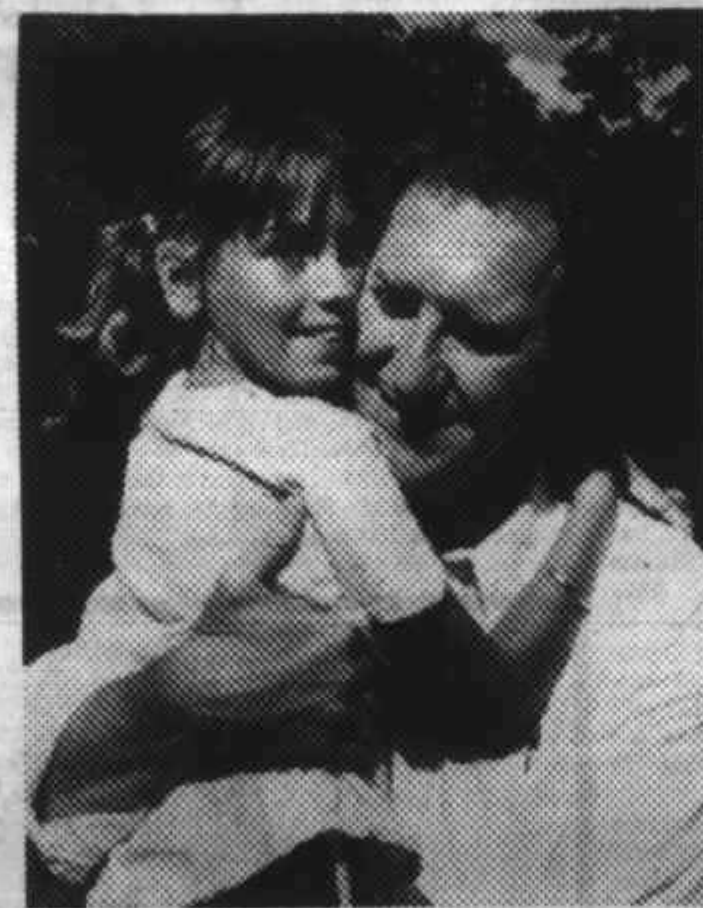

**Community pool opens May 29**

School is almost out of session for the summer and for the first time in eight years, children, parents and residents will enjoy swimming at the Eagle Lake Community Pool. The grand opening is scheduled for May 29.

The pool will be filled in the beginning of May. Children can have their water skills tested prior to opening day and register for swimming lessons, according to Paulette Klockman, pool committee member. Classes will be offered from beginners to advanced lifesaving.

All interested swimmers can save \$10 on a season pass by registering before May 28. During this pre-season sale, a one person pass is \$30; two persons, \$55; and three or more family members, \$75. Red cross group and private lessons are available. If a pass is not purchased, those wishing to swim will be charged \$2 per session.

Pricing was based on the actual 1983 operating budget in compliance with several cities in the area. "It was felt by the pool committee and Revitalize Eagle Lake Inc. for the pool to remain an advantage to all citizens, it would have to pay its own way," Mrs. Klockman said. The committee considered anticipated revenues and came up with the price.

The following is the 1984 pool schedule:

- 9:00-11:00 a.m., Red Cross lessons or private lessons.
- 11:00 a.m. - noon, special programs (all summer).
- The pool will be closed Sundays and Mondays during this time.
- \*Tuesday-exercise class.
- \*Wednesday-mother and child swim day.
- \*Thursday - exercise class.
- \*Friday - mother and child swim day.
- \*Saturday-reservations. 1:30-6:00 p.m.
- \*General public swimming. 7:00-9:00 p.m.
- \*Sunday-reservations.
- \*Monday-closed.
- \*Tuesday-reservations.
- \*Wednesday - adult swimming.
- \*Thursday, Friday & Saturday, reservations.

The pool is not supported by anything except money collected from swimming. "The annual budget is \$20,000, with the majority of those costs going to qualified personnel," Mrs. Klockman said. The pool will employ one manager and three full-time lifeguards.

"We need to raise \$6,000 for first year start-up costs and we utilized our pool repair budget," Mrs. Klockman said. The Lions Club is overbudgeted for repair of the pool house. A small portion of the AprilFest proceeds will support the pool.

"Donations to Revitalize Eagle Lake are tax deductible and can be made to any teller at the First

National Bank," Mrs. Klockman said.

Other donors include Lone Star Industries, sand for sand blasting; Superior Sand and Gravel, gravel for the driveway; Commercial Electric, wiring labor; Mr. McCreary, land; Don Beady, legal services; Ralph Truly, real estate appraisal services; and Coastal Contracting, equipment for sand blasting.

The city allotted \$21,000 for the pool projects, in addition to the \$1,000 received from the Lions Club. The committee is trying to raise an additional \$10,000 for operating costs. "Those funds have provided a pool that is worth an excess of \$250,000," Mrs. Klockman said.

Stecker Cows: good stocker cows and heifers \$300 to \$350; commercial and medium stocker cows and heifers, \$225 to \$300; good cow and calf pairs, \$500 to \$600; medium cow and calf pairs, \$400 to \$500; common cow and calf pairs, \$300 to \$400; old worn out, split and weighed.

Hogs: No. 1 hogs, 44 to 47.50 cents per pound; No. 2 and 3, 44 to 45 cents; feeder pigs and shoats, 50 to 60 cents per pound; sows, 36 to 45 cents.

Sheep: ewes, 10 to 20 cents per pound; lambs, 35 to 45 cents; bucks 10 to 20 cents; pairs \$25 to \$40 per pair.

**Local children to be fingerprinted**

There have been numerous accounts of children reported missing in large cities such as Houston and documentaries about misfortunes nationwide on programs as late as "20/20". Many parents feel that their child is immune to that tragedy and will remain safe in a small town; but it can happen anywhere.

To help insure the safety of your child, the Eagle Lake Volunteer Fire Department Ladies Auxiliary is sponsoring a "Prints For Life" program beginning May 8.

Authorities from the police department will aid in the fingerprinting sessions. The schedule is as follows:

- May 8 & 9, Eagle Lake Primary School; May 10 & 11, Eagle Lake Middle School; and May 12, from 9 a.m.-2 p.m., at the fire station for children and pre-schoolers who did not get printed while attending school.

"Prints For Life" was conceived with the sole purpose of providing identifying information in case a child is kidnapped, missing, or in some other way, unlawfully removed from his or her home.

Law enforcement agencies are prohibited from maintaining fingerprint files on children by state statute. Because fingerprints are easily identifiable and unchanging, they are used with the appropriate form for personal identification. Records should be kept in a safety deposit box or in a secure place with other important papers. This information will be readily available to you should the need occur.
