County Agent's Notebook

Rice production meetings scheduled May 15

Colorado County rice producers will have two opportunities Tuesday, May 15 to participate in Rice Production Clinics. The clinics will be held in Eagle Lake and Garwood at the Rice Growers Association offices in each community. The Eagle Lake clinic will be held at 9 a.m. and the Garwood clinic at 2 p.m. Resource people for the clinics will be Dr. Arlen Klusterboer, extension agronomist, and Dr. Roger Jones, extension plant pathologist. The clinics operate on an informal mode and provide an opportunity for rice producers to bring in their weed and grass problems, and to discuss other rice cultural problems that may be experiencing. The clinics are sponsored by the Colorado County Rice and Soybean Committee in cooperation with the Colorado County Extension Service Agent. Air conditioner workshop. Air conditioners are a standard item on most larger tractors and combine these days. Operating the tractor or combine from a large enclosed cab in a temperate environment is a very satisfying experience until the air conditioning unit malfunctions. At that point the enclosed cab becomes a broiler and a curse to the farmer. In an effort to avoid as many of these air conditioner breakdowns, an air conditioning workshop will be held on Thursday, May 17 from 9 a.m. until noon in the Garwood Implement Company building in Garwood. Tommy Valco, extension service engineer, will conduct the training which will show farm equipment owners tips and practices on routine maintenance and diagnostic repairs that can eliminate many air conditioner failures or costly trips to the repair shop. Producers are asked to bring tractors and combines that are experiencing air conditioning problems. A major portion of the workshop will be devoted to working on the units to "preventive" maintenance. This is a joint effort between the Colorado County Farm Bureau, Colorado County Rice and Soybean Committee and the County Extension Service. To prevent getting stuck, farmers should be certain they have a valid social security number for those they pay for services - before they write the paycheck. Obtaining the number is the farmer's only protection against having to pay someone else's tax. One may use IRS Form W-9 to obtain the social security numbers.
