Yanks sweep 2 from Pirates to take lead in major boys

Tuesday, the Yanks took advantage of a lack luster performance by the Pirates, and a fast watch by the officials to defeat the Pirates by a score of 7 to 2, in a game from 5:33 to 6:55, that broke a tie for first place in the Major Boys Little League in Eagle Lake.

The Yanks scored three in the first on four walks: a hit batter and a single by Robert Tillman. In the third they tallied twice on a pair of singles by Robert Tillman and Shawn Turner and a pair of doubles by Johnnie Gonzales and Casey Clipson. Robert Tillman and Mike Wilson put together two singles after a walk to Noble Anderson in the fifth to cap their scoring. Although the Pirates scattered eight hits they could only score two runs. Wade Satsky contributed two doubles for the Pirates which resulted in one run, while Greg Blair, David Certa, Kevin Jackson, Brian Center added singles. Johnnie Gonzales hit a double. The Pirates drew only three walks while giving up nine. Blair was the loser and Tillman the winner.

Friday's game between the Yanks and Pirates shaped up to be a real do or die match since each team has beaten the other this season, but after the Yanks got off with seven runs on only four hits and five Pirate errors in the bottom of the first inning, the game was already decided. The Yanks put together seven hits coupled with 10 walks to score their game winning 10 runs. Robert Tillman hit a single and a double and Glenn Lipperdt and Matthew Wilson got two singles. Shawn Turner worked Pirate pitching for four trips to the basepaths with a single and a trio of walks.

The Pirates sent only 11 batters to the plate through the third inning, and although they hit the ball hard nine of the 11 times, it was right at the Yanks defensive strength, only scoring in the second Brian Center on a Kevin Jackson sacrifice. In the fourth, Mike Gasca reached first on a free pass; took second on a passed ball, was pushed to third on successive walks to Brian Center and Kevin Jackson and stole home.

The Pirates looked more like themselves in the fifth when they quickly scored four runs with their first five batters but the rally died and the game ended 10-6, giving the Yanks a one game hold on first place.

On Tuesday, the third place Cubs jumped on the Dodgers, 8-4 in spite of a towering three run homer by Marshan (Pooh) Norris that cleared the Little League fence chasing Nick Shorter and Steve Garza in front of him. Norris' drive knotted the score at three until the bottom of the second when walks to Chris Cotton and Walt Meitzen set up for two more runs on sacrifice flies by Shane Glaiser and Jaime Marquart. In the third, Steve Garza took the hill for the Dodgers and retired the next seven batters giving up only a scratch single to Cubs, first sacker, Richard Spates, before being relieved by Efrin Gonzales in the fifth inning. The Dodgers scored their last run on a single by Pooh Norris, a walk to Ramon Cantu and a single to Kevin Dogins. Spates figured in the final scoring when he singled in

Deon Williams who had singled. He then scored himself on passes to Dela Garza, Robt Lujan and Shane Glaiser. Before Cantu made an acrobatical catch of a well hit line drive by Larry Taylor to end the inning. Scott was the winning pitcher and Cantu the loser.

Friday's Cub, Dodger game started just the Tuesday game, with the Cubs jumping on the Dodgers early. Cantu hit, lead off man J. Scott; gave up a single to Deon Williams, Efrin Gonzales booted Richard Spates into a single and gave up a two bagger to Jason Duarte before he was lifted for Steve Garza who fanned Dela Garza. Chris Cotton to shut down the rally at four.

The Dodgers returned the favor by casing Richard Spates with walks to Ben Castillo and Steve Garza and consecutive doubles to Efrin Gonzales; Pooh Norris and Ramon Cantu. Then J. Scott set the next three batters down in order, to end the scoring in the first at 5 to 4. Williams, Cotton, Jason Duarte and Dela Garza teamed up with two walks, a single and a double to score four more in the second. However, the Dodgers weren't finished as they batted the order around scoring another five runs on drives by Castillo, Norris, Cantu, Robert Gonzales; and passes to Almando Garza and Nick Shorter. The fourth was over quickly for

the Cubs but the Dodgers were still swinging their lead off bats as Steve Garza singled, Erfin doubled, Norris tripled and Cantu singled to end the scoring at 13 to 10 Dodgers. Each Dodger was on base at least once. The loser was Spates and the winner was Steve Garza.

This week's games pit the first place Yanks against the charging Dodgers, and the Pirates host the Cubs. Good games all.
