### First Baptist Church to show motion picture this Sunday

The First Baptist Church in Eagle Lake will be showing a motion picture release of International Prison Ministry entitled, "Changed Lives in San Quentin." The film is free to the public on Sunday, June 10 at 7:30 p.m. Actually filmed inside the prison, this documentary features the stories of four notorious criminals. Interviews conducted by Art Linkletter and the director of IPM, Chaplain Ray, focus on rehabilitation as a result of conversion to Christianity. From inside the gas chamber Jerry Graham says, "I came very close to ending it all right here." In stark contrast to his life of crime, he now directs a ranch for abused children. James Williams served time in San Quentin after a gun battle with police. Now he's employed by a criminal justice organization teaching men "the way to go out," as he puts it. Another changed life is George Meyer, Al Capone's favored driver. Now 74, he counsels teenagers about the evils of drug abuse. And Jack Burbridge, once an enforcer for organized crime, is now a preacher. The film concludes with a look inside the gas chamber.

**Recipe of the Week**  
TEXAS ONION RING CRISPIES



1 cup flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 eggs  
1/4 cup plus 3 tablespoons beer  
2 tablespoons melted butter

Sift together the flour, salt and baking powder. Beat the eggs slightly, and add the beer and the melted butter. Stir the dry ingredients into the liquids and mix until smooth. Cover and refrigerate for an hour.

Dip floured onion rings into batter and let excess drip back into bowl. Brown on each side 2 to 3 minutes until brown. (If batter becomes too thick, add a little more beer.) Drain fried onion rings and transfer to a foil-lined pan. Keep loosely covered at room temperature if not serving immediately. Reheat just for a few minutes in a hot oven before serving.

1 inch thick. Separate into rings, saving small rings for other use. Place onions in bowl or paper sack and add flour, toss to coat lightly. In a large skillet, pour cooking oil to a depth of 1 1/2 inches. Heat to 375 degrees.

### Fayette 3 unit scheduled to be ready for operation in mid-1988

Lower Colorado River Authority directors authorized the sale of \$295 million in revenue bonds for a lignite-fired third generating unit at the Fayette Power Project near La Grange. The issue is the first of approximately five such annual installments to pay for construction of the Fayette 3 unit, mine facilities at the nearby Cummins Creek area in northern Fayette County, and related general-improvement projects such as transmission lines and substations.
