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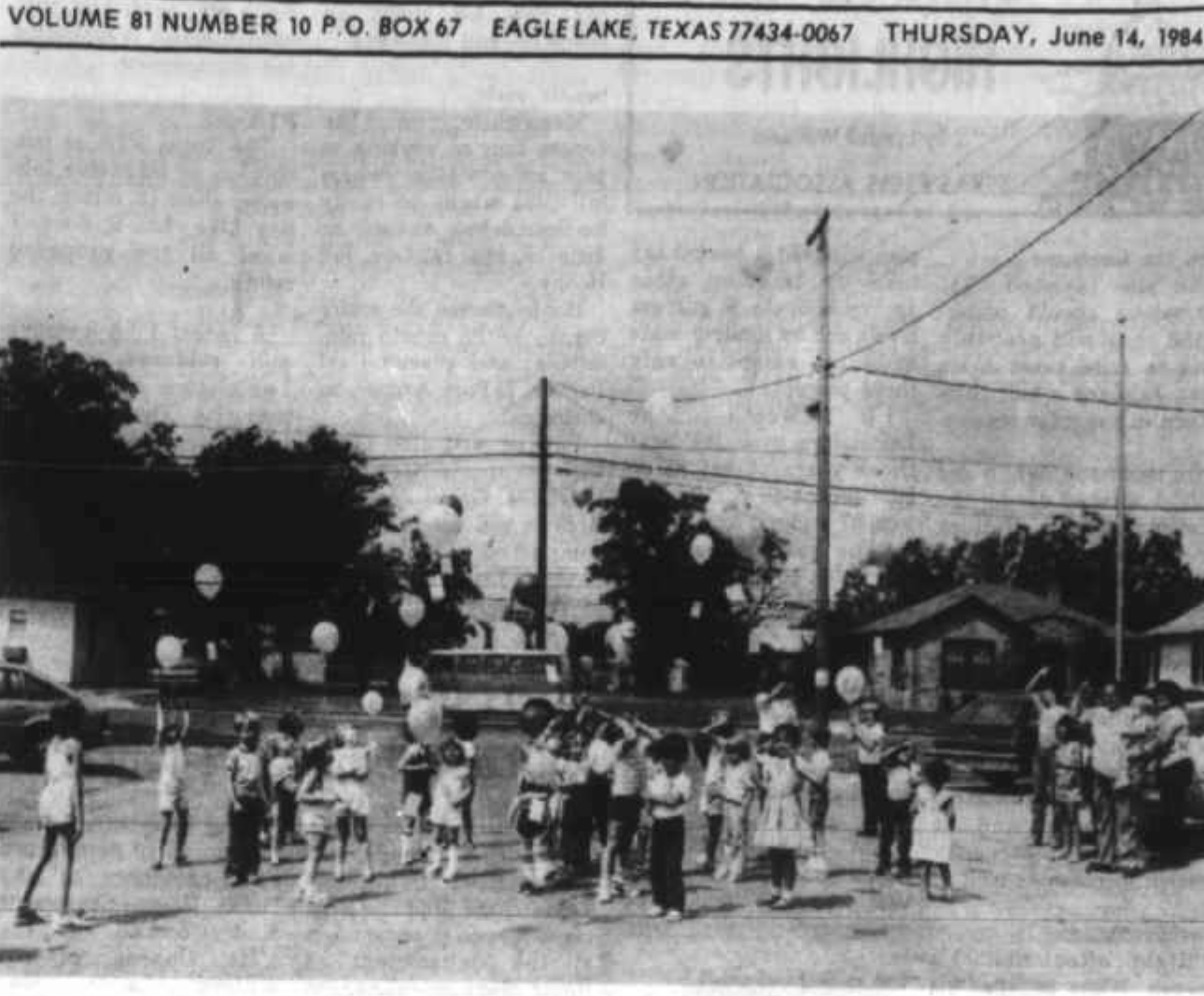

Police dept. 'debate' ends with air cleared

A confrontation between members of the Eagle Lake Police Department and Mayor Elmer Struss, ended in seeming friendliness Tuesday night after more than 90 minutes of discussion at council's bi-monthly meeting.

After council completed the topic portion of its agenda, Mayor Struss opened the meeting for discussion of the police department, since more than a dozen people were there either to listen, or to discuss police operations. Four of the department's five officers, including chief Charles Coulter, were among the group.

He began somewhat harshly, then tempered his delivery as he progressed. He answered each of the administrative questions which had been posed, related how he and council have given the authority to city manager Robert Struss said, but city or-

resident wanted to know why such a man might be unhappy with his new job. Coulter addressed council with some of the problems he felt were hampering his abilities, and several members of the department also spoke, without interruption by city officials. At the end of the reading by Coulter of a statement, in which he addressed the rumor of the possibility of his resigning, Mayor Struss then delivered his remarks.

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City, school district appraisal notices scheduled for mailing about July 1

The Colorado County Central Appraisal District mailed new property valuations to Columbus area residents Saturday, June 9. The Appraisal District is on schedule in sending valuations and Weimar residents are expected to receive their notifications the last week in June. Eagle Lake valuations will be mailed July 1.

Residents having any questions about their valuations by law have 15 days from the date received to request a hearing, according to Bill Youens, chief appraiser. However, we're not going to shut anyone off if time permits us to extend hearing dates.

The board will hear protests until all accounts

from the jurisdictions are certified which will be sometime in late July and all appeals will be heard at that time, Youens said.

The appraisal notices will show the recommended 1984 property value, and use the 1983 tax rates the first of the month, all taxes that are considered to be delinquent will increase at a rate of 1 percent per month, in addition to a one time 15 percent fee for attorney charges, Youens said.

In other matters members:

- Approved to pay bills as received. Amount due through the month of June for the appraisal bills totaled \$14,087.36, and for collection bills \$7,864.68.
- Signed a correction on the collection contract for the City of Eagle Lake. As

Columbus retail sales BOOMING figures show

If you pay attention to the checks area cities receive each month for their one-cent share of the sales tax paid on retail sales, and compare them to checks received at similar times last year, one thing is clear, Columbus and many other area Texas cities are booming.

Eagle Lake is an exception, showing a 24.4 percent decline for sales through April, and reported for the Texas comptroller by May 20.

For April, Columbus showed a tax increase of 77.6 percent for the month with a 27.6 percent share for the first four months of the year. Eagle Lake was up 16.8 percent for April. Weimar is up 50 percent for the month, and is two-tenths of one percent down for the year to date checks.

If you add all the checks Colorado County cities received for the year, the year-to-date increase is 2.2 percent.

In other area cities, those in Waller County show the largest increases for the month, with a whopping, cash-register busting 92.5 percent increase in Waller, and 84.6 percent in Brookshire. Comptroller Bob Bullock said the rebate to all Texas cities averaged 13 percent better than what they had gotten by this time last year.

Thomas gains votes, keeps victory after Janecka-called recount

After a select committee not Mrs. Janecka, however, Mrs. Thomas' vote count was first reported at 1,069. But, on Tuesday, June 5, a five-vote error was found, giving Mrs. Thomas 1,074. Friday's counting found the two other votes, making the last count for Mrs. Thomas 1,076.

The committee that did the re-count was Nolen Ehrlich, chairman; Hans Hammack, Loretta Sissom and Sylvia Marburger. They were appointed by county Democratic Chairman J. J. Henson, and qualified for the committee since they were registered voters, and were not officials in the June 2 election.

The recount started at 9 a.m. last Friday and was completed about 1:30 p.m. Mrs. Thomas' recount, and Mrs. Janecka was represented by her daughter-in-law. Election rules allow both candidates to be in the re-counting room, and to inspect ballots.

The recount also changed the totals for U.S. Senate candidate winner Lloyd Doggett and Nonchalant challenger Kent Hance. Hance remained the big lead winner in the county with 1,283 votes, while Doggett had 759. The election night report credited Doggett with 783 votes, and Hance with 1,281. Both men had representatives watching the Colorado County recount.

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Drilling ordinance changes asked

Two men who are independent petroleum lease negotiators made several suggestions to Eagle Lake city council Tuesday night for an ordinance the city is proposing to adopt for regulation of well drilling in the city limits.

That agenda item, plus others on street paving and the airport advisory board, were part of the business council conducted this week.

David Scott, who helps oil companies obtain drilling leases, made only two major suggestions for changes in the ordinance. He suggested that requirements for wells or storage tanks to be 1,000 feet from housing and other areas should be changed to 300 feet, or with permission from occupants, even closer. Scott also suggested the council meet enough time for the city's financial audit, so that the ordinance be adopted in time to study it. The audit shows we're pretty much in good financial condition, Struss said.
