Janelle Bauer, Charles Hooper, Jr. united in holy matrimony

The sanctuary of the First Baptist Church was the setting for the wedding of Miss Janelle Bauer and Charles Hooper, Jr. at half past six, Saturday, May 26, 1984. The Reverend Melburn Sibley, pastor of the First Baptist Church, performed the double ring ceremony.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Lee Bauer of Eagle Lake and the groom's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Charles Jackson Hooper of Houston.

The nuptial area was a setting of soft candlelight with an impressive grouping of nine branch candelabras, tree and white gladioli.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride selected a designer gown of ivory rayon organza and imported reemboirered Alencon lace. The bodice, featuring a sculptured vee neckline, was appliqued with traditional fitted sleeves came to a point over the wrist and were defined by lace appliques and fastened by tiny bridal buttons. The full A-line skirt fell softly from the empire waistline which was lavishly applied with Alencon lace near the hemline. The skirt fell gracefully into a train of chapel length and was defined by scalloped Alencon lace. A chapel length veil of ivory illusion and Alencon lace was attached to a headpiece defined by bridal pearls and Alencon lace. The veil was the creation of Ms. Virginia Snelling of Eagle Lake. For her bridal bouquet, the bride carried a cascade of white Frost roses and Stephanotis with accents of smilax and baby's breath.

Mrs. Brock Ashby, sister of the bride, was matron of honor. Bridesmaids were the groom's sisters, Mrs. Jess Oberhaus and Ms. Janel Bauer, and the groom's sister, Mrs. Jerry Bell of Austin.

For her attendants, the bride chose lovely marble mauve silk taffeta gowns designed by Priscilla of Boston. The gowns featured a square neckline, large puff sleeves and an elongated fitted bodice with a scalloped drop waist and a full gathered skirt which fell to slipper length. Each of the bridesmaids wore a cluster of alstroemeria lilies and baby's breath in her hair, and carried a bouquet of pink rubrum lilies, alstroemeria lilies, and statice in shades of pink accented with tropical foliage.

The flower girl, Miss Camille Ashby, niece of the bride, was dressed in an ivory gown accented with mauve ribbon that complimented the bride's gown. She carried a white basket of white satin rose petals which she scattered along the aisle preceding the bride.

The ring bearer, Master Lance Grigar, son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Grigar of Eagle Lake, carried the rings on an ivory cross stitched pillow designed and made by the bride's sister, Mrs. Ross Oberhaus. He wore a black tuxedo with a Stephanotis boutonniere.

They all wore black tuxedos with boutonnieres of alstroemeria lilies. Kenneth Reese, nephew of the bride, was a junior usher.

All the ushers wore black tuxedos with Stephanotis boutonnieres. For her daughter's wedding, Mrs. Bauer chose a Jack Bryan gown of pale peach chiffon fashioned with a deep squared neckline defined by peach beading. The long sleeves were caught by beaded wrist bands.

Mrs. Hooper, the groom's mother, chose a beige designer gown of chiffon with a wide bertha collar of reemboirered lace and beading that formed the shoulder and arm covering.

Pianist and organist, Jerrold Higgins of Bastrop and The Haverly Strings of Houston played favorite music of the bride prior to the ceremony. "Liebestraum" was played for the bride and groom. "Traditional Wedding March" was played for the bride. A beautiful duet of the "Lord's Prayer" was played by organist, Mr. Higgins, and violinist, Mr. Haverly, during the ceremony.

The bride's registration table, covered with a tiered lace white cloth and holding a votive candle arrangement of miniature carnations and daisies in shades of pink, was placed in the front yard. The bride and groom, surrounded by their guests, were seated at the reception table.

Placed under oak trees were guests tables with white floor length cloths. The center of each table held a votive candle arrangement of fresh spring flowers in shades of pink. White chairs with white lace cloths and centered with candelabra arrangements of rose peonies, alstroemeria lilies, and miniature carnations.

The groom's tables, held double ring chocolate cake were Mrs. Michael Grigar of Eagle Lake and Mrs. Michael Crow of Richmond.

After a wedding trip to San Francisco, Napa Valley, and Carmel, the bride and groom plan to reside in Houston.

The Bauer-Hooper wedding rehearsal was held Friday, May 25. Mrs. Melburn Sibley assisted her husband, the Reverend Melburn Sibley, in coordinating the wedding plans. Following the rehearsal, the wedding party and other guests were entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Jackson Hooper with a dinner at the Farris 1912.

During the evening the engaged couple presented tokens of remembrance to their attendants. Then the couple was toasted and roasted by friends and relatives. The evening ended with a comic slide presentation of Jackson Hooper's life presented by his cousin, Dr. Jim Giles.
