Lisa Lynn Frazar, William Farris wed

The candle lit sanctuary of United Methodist Church of Eagle Lake was the setting for the marriage of Miss Lisa Lynn Frazar and William Richard Farris on Saturday, June 30, 1984, at eight o'clock in the evening. The Reverends George Welch of Christ Episcopal Church and Charles Runk of United Methodist Church officiated at the single ring ceremony and Holy Communion service which united the young couple in marriage.

Parents of the bride are Brigadier General and Mrs. Joe Newton Frazar, Jr. of Eagle Lake, Mr. and Mrs. William Leon Farris, also of Eagle Lake, are parents of the groom.

The bride was escorted to the altar and given in marriage by her father. For her wedding she chose a formal white gown of summer white silk satin. The gown featured a wide sweetheart neckline trimmed with seed pearls. Scalloped Scheffli silk organza flowers adorned the puffed silk organza upper sleeves; the elbow length lower sleeves were made of English net and Venice lace sprinkled with seed pearls and iridescents and secured at the wrist by tiny satin covered buttons. Scheffli Venice lace, complemented by seed pearls and iridescents, generously detailed the fitted bodice and pearl covered basque waist. The softly gathered slipper length skirt flowed into a full cathedral length train with a scalloped hemline of Scheffli Venice lace heavily jeweled with seed pearls, rice pearls and iridescents. The voluminous skirt was intricately decorated with hand-beaded Italian inset lace. Complementing the gown was a slipper length veil of handmade Belgium lace on English net from Brugse, Belgium. A demi-veil of English tulle was gathered on a Juliet cap to form a blusher at the crown of the head. The double veils were secured by a wreath of fresh white dendrobium orchids and gypsophelia.

The bride carried a slipper length bouquet of white anthurium, sprays of white dendrobium orchids, chlorophyllum, gypsophelia and agapanthus florets designed in an abstract pattern over deep red anthurium and blue statice.

Attendants

Maid of honor was Miss Kathy Ann Frazar, sister of the bride, of San Antonio. Bridesmaids were Misses Christine Sykes and Patricia Mueller of San Antonio; Rebecca Wolford of Houston; and Alicia Harvey of Little Rock, Arkansas. The bridesmaid's gowns were designed by the bride and made of vibrant red silk moire. The fitted bodices featured deep V-necklines, both front and back, which were emphasized by a wide, crisp, double ruffle. Matching moire sashes accented the slim waists. They wore elbow length white gloves and a pearl necklace. Each girl carried a bouquet of red anthurium, blue statice, gypsophelia, chlorophyllum, springerit and Hahn ivy.

Members of the house party were Mrs. Carl Milenz of Columbus, Mrs. Duane Austin of Eagle Lake, Mrs. Arthur Lefkowitz of Houston, Misses Jane Altobelli, Carolyn Terrel, Suzy Sykes and Stacey Sager of San Antonio, Vickie Eberhardt of Brenham, and sisters of the groom, Mesdames E. Dale Dixon of Huntsville and Michael L. Grigar of Eagle Lake. Honorary members of the house party were Mrs. Richard D. Frazar, sister-in-law of the bride, of Abilene; Mrs. Victor Harvey of Little Rock, Arkansas; Mrs. Robert R. Wells, Jr., the bride's aunt, of Eagle Lake; and cousins of the bride, Mesdames Clarence Gore of Manama, Bahrain and Julia Blair and Clay Crawford of Houston. Members of the house party were presented corsages of red anthurium, blue statice and gypsophelia.

The groom chose Philip Leopold of Eagle Lake as his best man. Groomsmen were Alan Pate and Ed McInerney of Houston, Alfred Fowler, III of Daingerfield and Michael Friedman of St. Louis, Missouri.

Ushering guests were G. Brooks Frazar of Mexico City, D.F., brother of the bride, Joe Wendel of Eagle Lake and E. Dale Dixon of Huntsville and Michael L. Grigar of Eagle Lake, brothers-in-law of the groom.

The ringbearer, Master William Dale Dixon, nephew of the groom, carried the wedding band to the altar on an antique lace heirloom pillow belonging to the bride's aunt, Mrs. Robert R. Wells, Jr. of Eagle Lake.

The groom's attendants were attired in formal black tuxedos and wore boutonnières of white dendrobium orchids, gypsophelia and chlorophyllum.

Lighting the altar candelabrum prior to the ceremony was the bride's nephew, Richard Harrison Frazar of Abilene and her cousin, Jeffrey Wells Gore of Manama, Bahrain in the Persian Gulf.

The church sanctuary was aglow with soft candlelight. Behind the central altar a massive formal arrangement of red anthurium, white gladioli, blue and white agapanthus, static and gypsophelia with elegans, aspidistra and sprengii foliage formed the focal point under the sanctuary cross. Flanking the

arrangement were tall standards of arched candelabra with slim white tapered garlands in plumose fern; spiral candelabra, garlanded in plumose; the chancel area. Each pew of the central aisle was adorned with an arrangement of fresh flowers in the wedding colors. A white prie dieu garlanded in plumose graced the central altar.

As a special tribute to his bride, the groom performed his own arrangement on the piano of "Watching the Wheels" and "Lord Is It Mine" accompanied by the official musician, Jerrol Higgins, on the organ. Mr. Higgins also played a beautiful selection of traditional prelude music. The bride and her father entered to the strains of "God of Our Father" and the new Mr. and Mrs. Farris made their exit as Mendelssohn's traditional "Wedding March" filled the church.

For "something old" the bride wore a diamond solitaire drop, a gift from her parents on her sixteenth birthday; a beautiful re-embroidered lace handkerchief, a gift from Miss Alicia Harvey, represented "something new"; "something borrowed" was an opal and amethyst ring of her mother's; and "something blue" was a blue satin and lace garter.

Mrs. Frazar chose a gown of silver gray French lace and silk taffeta for her daughter's wedding. The fitted lace bodice extended to a full, softly gathered silk taffeta slipper length skirt. A matching silk taffeta pleated cummerbund with diminutive covered buttons fitted snugly around the waist. The V-neckline was complemented by a diamond and pearl necklace; a crystal beaded bag and a corsage of white dendrobium orchids completed her ensemble.

For her son's wedding, Mrs. Farris selected an iridescent silk sheath gown fashioned with one bare shoulder. The covered shoulder was designed with a long raglan sleeve with a voluminous drape of silk falling diagonally to the hemline. Gold slippers, a jeweled evening bag and a corsage of purple dendrobium orchids completed her attire.

Reception

Following the wedding, General and Mrs. Frazar hosted a reception for their daughter and her new groom at The Farris 1912. Guests were registered at a table covered in a floor length cloth of heavy red ottoman moire topped by an antique crocheted coverlet. The table was decorated with a five branch silver epergne which contained crystal votive cups and flowers in the bridal colors.

The tall candelabrum wedding cake was the focal point of a table covered in the same moire and lace as the registry table. Mrs. Henry Dostal of Eagle Lake created the beautiful cake which was decorated with fresh anthuriums cascading between the tiers and over the sides of the cake. The uppermost tier was decorated with an Austrian cut crystal bride and groom.

A long buffet table was centered in the lower apse. A massive arrangement of fresh flowers in a silver compote was flanked by five branch candelabra on either side. A nearby English server held the silver coffee and punch services while champagne was offered at bars located on each floor. Silver appointments were used throughout.

The bride tossed her bouquet from the hotel staircase which was swagged in heavy white satin roping and bows. Miss Patricia Mueller of San Antonio caught the bridal bouquet and G. Brooks Frazar of Mexico City, D.F. caught the bride's garter which was thrown from the same staircase by the bridegroom.

Red satin rosebuds filled with rice were passed out by the bride's young cousins, Misses Jennifer Rush Blair of Houston and Carey Elizabeth Gore of Manama, Bahrain and the groom's niece, Miss Alyssa Dixon of Huntsville.

For travel the new Mrs. Farris chose a navy blue linen suit, red shell sweater, red hat and a corsage of red anthurium. The groom chose to travel in a bright red blazer and white slacks.

The new Mrs. Farris graduated from Rice High School in 1980 and received her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree with a concentration in Photography from the University of Texas San Antonio in May 1984. She is a member of Zeta Tau Alpha Sorority.

Mr. Farris also graduated from Rice High School in 1980 and received his Bachelor of Arts degree with a concentration in architecture in May of 1984 from Rice University where he was a member of Hanszen College.

After a wedding trip to Oaxaca, Mexico and Mexico City, Mr. and Mrs. Farris will remain in Eagle Lake for a brief period of time before moving to Los Angeles, California where they will reside for approximately one year.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Fajkus of Eagle Lake and the groom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Pavlu of Garwood.

Inside the church, a massive fan-shaped arrangement of white gladioli, pom pom mums, Gypsophila and greenery provided a background for the altar. Two large spiral candelabra graced each side of the altar, and to either side of the chancel area were tall white columns holding arrangements of white gladioli, pom pom mums, Gypsophila, greenery and English ivy. The aisle was marked with white satin bows centered with Stephanotis. The traditional unity candle ceremony was conducted.

Musical selections were provided by soloist Mrs. Irene Ralph of El Campo accompanied by organist Mrs. Clarence Martin of Garwood. The wide cuffed Bishop sleeves came to a point below the wrist and also were beaded.

Tiny covered buttons fastened the cuffs and back of the bodice. Above the A-line skirt, the natural waist flowed into a lower torso back ending in gathers of organza, sweeping into a court train bordered with wide scalloped Alencon lace.

For her headdress, the bride selected a wreath of white silk roses, Stephanotis and dried statice delicately entwined with bridal pearls which held a full finger tip veil.

The bride's table was skirted with white gathered lace and centered with the bridal cake; a beautiful three-tiered confection accented with lilies and sugar spun roses in shades of pink, rose and burgundy. The top tier was adorned by an ornament of a beaded heart frame and a glittered chapel bell featuring the bridal couple. The first and second tiers were separated by columns enhanced by cupids and centered by a small silk flower arrangement.

All three tiers were elevated by six tall columns above a fountain flowing with pink water. Chapel bells were suspended between each column. Surrounding the fountain was a wreath of variegated pink and burgundy silk flowers. Six heart-shaped cakes of assorted flavors circled the tiered cake, each centered with a cupid figurine. To the right was the serving area for fruit punch set in a lovely silver punch bowl; to the left, the bride's bouquet was surrounded by the bridesmaids' bouquets, flower girls' baskets and satin heart-shaped ring pillow.

The groom's table, covered with ivory burlap, was centered with a silver candelabra and a silver champagne urn. The groom's cake was a double-layered German chocolate cake, iced in chocolate and centered with a marzipan plaque, topped by star-tipped tools. A conical figurine accented the cake with the inscription "Love to Mr. Fixit" on the red marzipan hearts. The cake was surrounded with ferns and English ivy.

Both the bride and groom's cake were designed and created by the groom's mother, Mrs. Lillian Pavlu.
